Development

- Facilitated activities to strengthen college culture through the creation of opportunities for faculty and staff to interact, in particular a New Faculty Reception for College faculty and staff and Holiday Reception for faculty and staff.

Student Success

- Facilitated more active involvement of department chairpersons and faculty with recruitment, which included enhanced levels of outreach and communication (i.e., phone calls, emails). A notable result in this area was the development and implementation of the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice's Ambassador Program, which integrates the use of GIS and alumni to identify and reach out to potential recruits.
- Facilitated discussions with the College Enrollment Management Committee to focus on developing strategies for recruitment and retention, as well as developing college-wide strategies to address retention, progression and graduation rates.

- Provided nearly 90 students with financial support to attend and/or present at professional conferences.
- Provided funding for a GA to work with students on probation in the College Success Center.
- Provided funding, along with the Graduate School, to bring graduate stipends in Criminology and Criminal Justice more in-line with the national average.
- Facilitated discussions with HPED to develop department name that better reflects current and future state of the department. Department name changed to “Kinesiology, Health and Sport Science”.
- Facilitated discussions with department chairpersons to develop a holistic admissions criteria that provides more thorough examination of qualifications beyond SAT scores. These discussions resulted in several of our programs adjusting their criteria and several other departments are in the process of adjusting theirs as well.
- Facilitated discussions with department chairpersons on curriculum refinement to more effectively facilitate student progression as well as more efficient use of resources. A notable example in this area were revisions done to the Nursing Master’s Program.
- Facilitated discussions to bring the HSAD program to fulltime through the use of innovative technology. The Zoom system was implemented during Spring 2015 allowing the department to reach place-bound students and develop a sustainable cohort model.
- Facilitated KHSS Curriculum revision in B.S in Education and HPED that broadens focus on health promotion and includes non-education based degree tracts.
- Facilitated expanded partnership between Nursing Department and Saudi Arabia Cultural Mission. Initially, this led to increased international interest in the Nursing M.S. program and continues to build a foundation for expansion into B.S. and Ph.D. programs.
- Worked with alumni, faculty and administrators on exploring international partnerships with Trinidad and Tobago, Suriname and Jamaica. Visited with potential educational, governmental and industry partners in these countries in June 2014, October 2014 and May 2015. These efforts resulted in co-hosting panels on Cyber Security at the annual Health, Environment, Safety and Securing Conference in Trinidad and Tobago (October 2015) and signed a MOU with the Suriname College of Hospitality and Tourism as well as the University of Trinidad and Tobago.
- Facilitated discussions with the Arab American University in Palestine and several Universities in Jordan about programs in Nursing and Allied Health, Criminology and Safety Sciences.

Faculty and Staff Success

- Refined the manner in which travel awards were awarded, and increased college-level travel funding to faculty at various levels of their professional career (Assistant, Associate, Professor). In total, all faculty who applied to departments received some level of funding. Additional funding was provided to faculty who applied to the college and were supported by their department chairpersons.

- Facilitated the development of the Research and Scholarship Academy in Fall 2015. Modeled after IUP's Center for Teaching Excellence, this Academy will be led by a faculty member who will lead and promote research and scholarship activities throughout the college.
- Developed "HHS College Incentive Grants" (maximum \$5,000) to encourage research intended to lead to peer-reviewed publications and larger external grants.
- Worked with the HHS Awards Committee to develop several new awards: The Outstanding Junior Researcher, The Outstanding Service Award, Outstanding Junior Faculty Teaching Award, as well as an Outstanding Junior Faculty Service Award.
- Facilitated regular meetings with staff where workload issues are discussed, policies reviewed, and best practices shared.
- Worked closely with several department chairpersons and staff to successfully upgrade staff members from CT2 to CT3.
