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

Dr. Christina Huhn published a research article on the content of post-secondary beginning Spanish text-books in The TFLTA Journal, a double-blind, peer reviewed journal published by the Tennessee Foreign Language Teaching Association. Her article titled "Integration of the National Foreign Language Standards in Post-Secondary Beginning Spanish Textbooks" is available online, as part of the spring/summer 2018 issue, http://www.tflta.org/journal.html. Additionally, Dr. Huhn gave a roundtable presentation entitled "Multi-Level World Language Classes: State of the Field" with co-presenter Dr. Patricia Davis-Wiley from The University of Tennessee at the annual ACTFL Convention in New Orleans, November 17. The presentation was the initial phase of a project to investigate the practice of combining class levels in a single class session.

Dr. Vicente Gomis-Izquierdo attended the 15th annual Southeast Coastal Conference on Languages and Literatures in Savannah, GA. He presented a paper titled "La presencia de la mujer en El Anacronópete de Enrique Gaspar y Rimbau."

Dr. Eileen W. Glisan was appointed in August 2018 to the Advisory Board of the Center for Advanced Language Proficiency Education and Research (CALPER). The national resource center was recently funded as a 4-year project through the Title VI US Dept of Education Language Resource Center grant and is a collaborative project between the Pennsylvania State University and the University of Pittsburgh. Additionally, Dr. Glisan co-presented a session at the fall conference of the Pennsylvania State Modern Language Association (PSMLA), held in October 2018 in Pittsburgh. The session was titled "High-Leverage Teaching Practices: Deconstructing and Enacting Complex FL Teaching Practices." She also presented a full-day workshop on the same topic for the Texas Association of Language Supervisors in San Antonio, Texas in October 2018. Additionally, she co-presented a full-day pre-conference workshop at the annual ACTFL Convention held in New Orleans, LA, in November 2018; the topic of the workshop was "Enacting the Work of Language Teaching Through High-Leverage Practices."

Dr. Shijuan Liu gave a presentation titled "A Review of Tools and Resources for Teaching and Learning Chinese Characters with Technologies" and an invited workshop titled "Virtual Reality Technology and Its Applications in the Teaching and Learning of Chinese Language and Culture" at the 10th International Conference and Workshops on Technology and Chinese Language Teaching held at National Taiwan Normal University, Taipei, June 1-3, 2018. In addition, Liu conducted an invited 2-day workshop titled "Effective Use of Technology in K-16 Chinese Language Classrooms" at the Center for Advanced Language Proficiency Education and Development (CALPER), Pennsylvania State University, June 22-23, 2018. Additionally, Dr. Liu gave a presentation titled "Virtual Reality Technology for Education: Exploration and Discussion" at the Technology Day held at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, August 22, 2018. Liu also gave a presentation titled "Is Virtual Reality Technology Useful for Language Education?" at the 2018 Autumn Symposium of Chinese Language Teachers Association of Western Pennsylvania (CLTA-WPA) held at Carnegie Mellon University, October 14, 2018. Furthermore, Dr. Liu gave an invited keynote speech titled "Making the Most of Informal Learning in Chinese Language Education with Technology" at the 4th Online Chinese Teaching Forum & Workshop (OCTFW4) held at Michigan State University, November 3-4, 2018. Lastly, Dr. Shijuan Liu published one article titled "Teaching and learning Chinese language online: What and why?" in the International Chinese Language Education, 3(2), 11-26.
