Jazminn Jones, a student in a Chinese 202 class at IUP, won third place in the Junior Level Group at the third annual Eastern U.S. Chinese Proficiency Competition, held April 7, 2012 at Pace University in New York. After the competition, Jones was interviewed by Voice of America (VOA). Eighty students from twenty-three universities in the Eastern U.S. region participated. This was the first time IUP students attended this annual contest. The finalists were chosen from preliminary contests held at various places in the Eastern U.S. Three students, including Jones from IUP, attended the preliminary contest at Saint Vincent College on March 24. 

Speaking in Spanish becomes your lifestyle because you have no other choice. Instead of only hearing it in class you hear it everywhere you go, you read it on the street signs, and only study for your classes in Spanish.

in the culture is definitely helping me see things from a different perspective and even appreciate some things that I take for granted. In many of my classes the theme Carpe diem has come up quite a few times and that's one lesson that I've truly been able to apply here and that I hope to keep in my heart for as long as I live. 


Study abroad is an amazing experience for so many reasons. If you take advantage of all the opportunities to learn, make new friends, and travel, it'll be an experience you'll never forget.




Fiesta Latina October 2011




Chinese New Year Celebration February 2, 2012

Dr. Eileen W. Glisan recently attended a meeting of the STAR-TALK Task Force, a National Security Language Initiative (NSLI), whose mission is to increase the number of Americans learning, speaking, and teaching "critical need" foreign languages by offering students (K–16) and teachers of these languages creative and engaging summer experiences that strive to exemplify best practices in language education and in language teacher development.

Dr. Glisan also co-presented a session at the Modern Language Association annual convention held in Seattle, Washington in January 2012. The topic of the session was "Toward a Standards-Based Research Agenda." Additionally, Dr. Glisan is currently directing the national Research Priorities in Foreign Language Education Project, sponsored by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL). Phase I of the initiative will culminate in the publication of nine literature reviews in a special issue of Foreign Language Annals to appear in May 2012, co-edited by Dr. Glisan.

Dr. Christina Huhn has published "CAI and the ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines" in the fall 2011 issue of the International Association for Language Learning Technology Jour*nal.* Recent conference presentations included a session at the annual American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages convention in Denver, CO, November 18–20, 2011. The session was entitled "In Search of Innovation in Teacher Preparation: On Oral Proficiency Levels and Innovative Preparation Models." Publication is forthcoming (May 2012). She also presented research on the classroom practices of K-12 language teachers in a session entitled "Learners Wanted: Strategies and Methods in World Language Classrooms" at the Southern Conference on Language Teaching, March 22-24, 2012 in Atlanta, GA.

Dr. Shijuan "Laurel" Liu was invited to conduct a workshop to K-16 Chinese language instructors at the First Annual Chinese Pedagogical Workshop at Penn State University,

State College, on December 3, 2011. The title of the workshop was "Online Tools and Resources for Elementary Mandarin Courses." In addition, Dr. Liu presented at the 2012 Northeast Association for Language Learning Technology (NEALLT) held at Carnegie Mellon University, on March 31, 2012. The title of the presentation was "Examination of the Use of the Online Games in Chinese Language Teaching and Learning."
