



Guest Speaker Gives Talks on a Chinese Novel and Chinese Language Learning

The Chinese Program invited Dr. Katherine Carlitz, the Chinese Studies Coordinator of the Asian Studies Center and the Assistant Director for Academic Affairs at the University of Pittsburgh, to give a talk on *Plum in the Golden Vase* (金瓶梅), a classical Chinese novel, on March 23, 2015. The talk was open to students enrolled in FNLG 121 classes (Chinese Literature in English) as well as any interested community members. Dr. Carlitz also met and shared her Chinese language learning experience with students in CHIN 281 and CHIN102 courses. Dr. Sean McDaniel, Chair of the Department, attended the talk and met with Dr. Carlitz over lunch. Dr. Carlitz received her Ph.D. and M.A. in Chinese Literature from the University of Chicago, where she studied with Dr. David Roy, the translator of the novel.

Message from Dr. Pete Brooks in Costa Rica



"This semester I have had the unique opportunity to engage in a professor exchange with Professor Roger Retana Calderón of the Universidad Nacional, located in Heredia, Costa Rica, just west of the capital city, San José. We are in Costa Rica's Central Valley, the most heavily populated part of this beautiful Central American country where the temperature fluctuates very little, with daytime highs in the lower 80's and nighttime lows about 58. It's paradise! Once one gets out of the Central Valley, however, it can get quite warm during this time of the year, what they call summer, el verano, but also known as the dry season because it rains very little during any of these days."

"I arrived on January 20 and the academic year began on February 9. I got to escape the beginning of the coldest part of the year in western PA (Hurray!) and will be here teaching my 3 courses until the semester ends closer to the end of June. While here, I've been assigned to teach three English courses in the Escuela de Literatura y Ciencias del Lenguaje in the Facultad de Filosofía y Letras, which are (1) Composition, (2) Advanced Grammar, and (3) Oral Expression and Listening Comprehension. The students in these classes are majors either in the English B.A. program or in the program for teaching English. My classes have on average 18 students who are eager to learn English, and many of them have confessed that they "love English." This is their mantra, and I've been quite impressed with the level of English many of them already command. I love teaching them idiomatic expressions in English and telling them about Pittsburghese!

My classes are early morning classes. In fact, on Mondays I have a class (Oral Expression) that starts at 7:00am and goes until 9:30. Mondays are very early days for me, but this really is no problem because being closer to the Equator, the sun is up much earlier here, and many people are already out and about before 7:00am, and the hustle and bustle around my apartment wakes me up very early, most especially because there's a flight that departs the airport in Alajuela at 4:30am on most days. On other days, classes begin at 8:00, but my teaching day is complete by 9:40am on Tuesday and Thursday and by 11:40 on Monday and Wednesday.

I have to use public transportation while here, taking a bus each day from near my residence, which usually takes about 20 minutes to get closer to the university, but then I have a walk of about 9 blocks during which I get to dodge cars, trucks and buses. The pedestrian has no right of way here, so walker, beware! Yes, I do miss having my own car to use but the bus system is easy once you get the swing of it, and it's pretty inexpensive, costing only 230 Colones each way, around \$0.30.

It's great being back in a Spanish speaking environment! That said, because I am teaching English, I use my native language all day with students and faculty, although I do interact with office personnel and building custodians only in Spanish. Also, the elderly couple who live downstairs from me and their many family members who come by on a regular basis do not speak English. Because I have many meals with them, we communicate only in Spanish.."

Visiting Professor Róger Retana Calderón from Costa Rica



Róger Retana, 57, is a visiting professor in our Department this semester. He is a Professor of French and Spanish in Heredia, Costa Rica. He studied at La Sorbonne in Paris, France for seven years, and afterwards he stayed in France to work as an assistant professor of Spanish. In 1987 he returned to Costa Rica, where he works at Universidad Nacional in the School of Literature and Language Studies. During his 28 years as a professor, he has taught French, Spanish, culture, translation and composition. He held the position of Coordinator of the Department of French and Hispanic Studies, and he was the co-director of the abovementioned School. During the Fall semester of 1995, professor Retana participated as an exchange professor with IUP. He has always strived to extend awareness of French language and culture, and even created a radio program to that effect in 1999. This program was nationally broadcasted and was aimed at Costa Rican students.

He adapted and directed for the stage the book *The Little Prince* by Antoine de Saint Exupéry. He also taught at workshops on foreign language pedagogy in Central America. For four years he offered courses on Hispanic American culture for the Summer program of the Escuela Española at Middlebury in Vermont. While in Middlebury, he was renowned for his participation in the Zarzuelas at the College and also as the organizer of a "pasacalle" as an expression of the culture of his own country and the Hispanic world.

Sometimes, our guest professor gets stricken by the Muse of poetry, as he is the author of several articles about Voltaire and his *English Letters*. He also authored French textbooks for Costa Rican university students. He also dabbles as a cook and is known for his crepes.

This Spring semester, professor Retana is at IUP for the second time teaching Spanish and French. This experience has meant braving the cold weather, but also seeing again the friends he made in 1995 and making new ones. His expertise as an educator has been enriched by the contrast between the teaching methodologies both in the U.S. and his native Costa Rica.

We welcome and thank him, and wish him the best experience at IUP!

Faculty Scholarly Activities

Dr. Kathy Barton presented at the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese (AATSP) in Panama City, Panama, in July 2014. Her presentation, "A Lesson in Teaching Spanish Gender", explored the questions: What is grammatical gender? Why is gender and agreement often a difficult concept for students whose first language is English to fully grasp? Dr. Barton presented research on the phenomenon of grammatical gender as it occurs in the Spanish language and, with that background of information, discussed the development of a pedagogical grammar that would help promote a clearer conceptualization and greater facility in acquisition among students learning Spanish in a communicative and proficiency-oriented classroom. In November, along with over 6,000 language educators from around the world, Dr. Kathy Barton attended the 2014 American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) Annual Convention and World Languages Expo in San Antonio, Texas. Additional time was spent by Dr. Barton being immersed in the Hispanic culture and taking in the sights, sounds, and events of historical San Antonio.

Dr. Eileen W. Glisan presented several workshops this semester for foreign language faculty at the secondary and post-secondary levels. She conducted a workshop for faculty at the University of Pennsylvania on the Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA) and gave the keynote speech on "Active Language Learning: On the Role of Meaning, Interaction, and Novelty" for the 2015 Penn Language Center Symposium. Dr. Glisan presented a talk at the Middlebury Institute of International Studies at Monterey (CA) as part of the Leo Van Lier Lecture Series; the title of her talk was "Crossing the Border: Helping Students Reach Advanced-Level Proficiency". At the secondary level, she conducted a workshop on "Curricular Planning for Language Learning in the 21st Century" for world language faculty in the Gateway School District in Monroeville, PA. Additionally, she presented two workshops on the topic of developing oral interpersonal communication for language teachers in the Pittsburgh Public Schools. Dr. Glisan continues to co-direct the national Research Priorities in Foreign Language Education Project, now beginning its fourth year, which seeks to promote research on areas that have been identified as national priorities for advancing language education.

Dr. Christina Huhn and **Dr. Shijuan "Laurel" Liu** gave a presentation entitled "Understanding the Realities of Digital Natives at IUP" at the IUP Technology Day, in January 2015. In addition, **Dr. Liu** presented at the IUP Reflective Practice Large Group Meeting, together with three faculty members from other Departments in March. She also presented her scholarly work at the 2015 Spring Symposium of the Chinese Language Teachers Association of Western Pennsylvania (CLTA-WPA) at the University of Pittsburgh, in April 2015, together with a graduate of the IUP English Department. The title of their presentation was "A Study of Non-Native Chinese Language Instructors as Successful Learners: Preliminary Findings."

Dr. Heide Witthöft presented a paper called "(Non)Person: Jean-Baptiste Grenouille's (Un)Real Existence" as part of the session on *Homely, Unhomely, Uncanny: The Familiar and the Unfamiliar in German Literature and Culture.* 2014 PAMLA Conference. Riverside, CA. October 31–November 2, 2014.


