<p>What is the Justification for Dual Listing these particular two course?</p>	<p><i>Please address the pedagogical reasoning for why these classes can be combined. This should be more than just the content is the same.</i></p> <p>Our department has an established focus on Applied Anthropology in our undergraduate curriculum. This focus reflects trends in our discipline and helps to prepare our students for professional work in a range of career tracks. Many of our majors enter graduate programs in applied anthropology after graduation. Completing an honor's thesis in applied anthropology is particularly valuable to our students, making them competitive for graduate programs. This particular class (ANTH 360) is easily adapted to meet the needs and interests of students at the graduate level, given that we do have MA students in our department, and undergraduate students who must complete graduate level coursework in order to complete the departmental Honor's Program.</p>
<p>How will the course be structured?</p>	<p><i>Briefly explain, how are you specifically maintaining the quality of education for each classification (level) of student in the class?</i></p> <p>Lower Level Class</p> <p>The lower level course divides students into groups in order to design and complete an original research project for a client. Classes are typically divided between work-shopping these applied projects, and lecture/discussion of readings related to the history, methods, and domains of practice of applied anthropology work. These two core topics are then complemented by professional development activities specifically related to anthropology majors.</p> <p>Upper Level Class</p> <p>Students taking this class at the graduate level would be expected to assume a leadership role in their applied projects, in addition to completing advanced work that complements the class material. This advanced work is likely to include an expanded rendering of findings for the client in multiple formats and an annotated bibliography with accompanying essay related to a domain of practice in applied anthropology.</p>
