The list of courses was deleted from the minor. The phrase "Three Additional Courses listed with an ARHI prefix except ARHI 101" was added

3. Justification

The list of courses was deleted and the phrase "Three Additional Courses with an ARHI prefix except ARHI 101" was added for the following reasons:

- a) The Art History curriculum is undergoing minor and major revisions. For example, ARHI 321 History of World Ceramics and ARHI 424 Art of India and Southeast Asia are two new courses recently approved by Senate. The latter is an Asian Studies elective and fulfills the Non-Western Liberal Studies requirement. The two courses broaden the spectrum of the Art History's offerings. The phrase "three additional courses with an ARHI prefix" will allow students to count courses with an ARHI prefix currently not on the list towards the minor.
- b) The ARHI 101 course should not count towards the minor, since the course is an art appreciation class.

Part III. Implementation

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program?

The proposed revision will not affect students already in the existing program, except to give them more flexibility in completing the minor.

2. Are faculty resources adequate? Demonstrate how this course will fit into the schedule of current faculty.

Faculty resources are adequate. The existing faculty will incorporate new courses in the division's three year rotation.

3. Are other resources adequate?

Other resources are adequate.

4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of these revisions?

It is difficult to assess a future increase or decrease in the number of students. The Art History Minor has seen a significant increase of students since its implementation in 2004; however that increase is almost impossible to measure accurately, since the division has had difficulties extracting accurate records of enrolled minors. From informal surveys of minor advisees and course enrollment, approximately 35 students are enrolled in the Art History Minor. Some increase to this minor is possible because of the non-western designation of ARHI 425 Art of India and Southeast Asia; however the increase should not affect resources, especially since the new courses will be offered on a rotating basis.

The evaluation of the Art Department is carried out every five years by an accrediting body, NASAD, which includes specific criteria for Art History curricula. Some of the criteria used to measure the Art History department includes: percentages of upper- level courses; percentages of non-western courses; student interviews; faculty interviews; presence of an audio visual center.
