#### 3. Rationale for Change.

- A. As per changes in the Liberal Studies requirements the reduction of credits from Natural Sciences and the deletion of LBST 499 is being made.
- **B.** The reduction of studio requirements within the BA program is to comply with NASAD recommendations to more strongly distinguish its philosophical and professional differences from the BFA program requirements.
- **C.** The addition of ART 281 special topics is meant to accommodate varying special topics offerings at the appropriate curricular levels.
- **D.** The change of wording to include intermediate level courses (300 level) is to specify program options and offerings.
- E. New Course offerings in ceramics were included in program offerings as per the need for expanded offerings in that area.

1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program? The revised program would go into effect for the 2012-2013 academic year and not adversely affect students currently enrolled.

Faculty resources are adequate. The current faculty member has already begun to implement the two new courses into his workload via means of special topics courses over the past two years. As he previously taught two sections of ART 214, and one section of ART 452 / 572 per semester, he proposes to only offer one section of the ART 214 along with ART 452/572 and to offer one of the new courses per semester on a rotation basis per semester. Fall: ART 314, Spring: ART 352. This reduction in the offerings of ART 214 has not had adverse effects upon the department or enrollments within other upper level courses.
