# 1. Catalog Description DISB 440 Ethical and Professional Behaviors

1c-01-1cr

Prerequisites: DISB Major, junior standing, 2.75 GPA

Emphasizes the professional standards and ethical behaviors of disability services professionals. Information about and the laws surrounding the ages of birth to three years and over 21 years of age will be covered. Students will be exposed to the wide range of services in which they can be employed.

Students will be able to:

- A. Explore their knowledge and understanding of the CEC Ethical Principles and Practice Standards and the CEC Standards for Professional Practice
- B. Investigate the importance of day-to-day responsibilities in agencies that lead to efficient program management
- C. Demonstrate an understanding of the legal issues and responsibilities as they relate to the consumers in the birth three years of age and adult populations
- D. Express an awareness and understanding of principles of ethical etiquette
- E. Evaluate the variety of agencies where they can work
- F. Analyze perspective sites and apply to an approved internship site

## **Course Analysis Questionnaire**

## Section A: Details of the Course

- A1 This course is a required course for the Disability Services majors. It teaches content that is not covered in any other classes the students take. This is the only course in their program designed specifically for these students.
- A2 This course does not require any changes to existing courses.
- A3 This course has not been offered as a special topics class. We attempted to meet the students' needs with the existing EDEX 440 class but it did not meet requirements of the program and is will be used for the proposed EDEX 7-12 program.
- A4 This course will not be dual listed
- A5 This course will not be taken for variable credit.
- A6 We have similar courses here at IUP ECSP 440 and EDEX 440. I did not find other universities with this specific course, probably because the programs have this content built into various courses as opposed to a standalone course.
- A7 The program just completed an external 5<sup>th</sup> year review. It was recommended in that review that ethical behaviors and practices be included in courses. Because of the nature of the program we could not include these in existing classes which are designed for other programs. The committee proposed to the administration that a course be developed to meet these needs. This recommendation was approved by Dr. Nardi.

## Section B: Interdisciplinary Implications

- B1 This course will be taught by qualified faculty from the EDEX program
- B2 The content of this course does not overlap with any other at the University
- B3 This course will not be cross-listed.

## Section C: Implementation

- C1 There are several members of the EDEX faculty who are qualified to teach this course. It will count as one preparation and one credit load.
- C2 Other resources:
  - a. Space are adequate
  - b. No special equipment is necessary
  - c. No laboratory supplies and other consumable goods are required
  - d. Library materials are adequate
  - e. No travel funds are required
- C3 There are no grant resources for this course
- C4 Because of the current enrollment of the DISB program, it will currently be offered once annually during the spring semester. Students who will be interning the following summer, fall, and spring semesters will be required to take the course
- C5 Based on current enrollment, only one section, once a year will be required.
- C6 The course would have an enrollment of approximately 20. The number is based upon the current enrollment in the program and where they are in the process toward graduation. We have approximately 8 interns going out per semester and 4 in the summer, this makes 20 interns annually
- C7 No professional society makes limits enrollment in a course of this nature.
- C8 This not a distance education course.
