## **Catalogue Description:**

EC 283 Environmental Economics

1 to 3 sh

Prerequisites: EC 101 or EC 122

Examination of economic costs and benefits of environmental control and modification. Techniques of economic analysis are used to understand economic aspects of environmental problems and contribute toward their solution.

## **Description of Proposed Change:**

This is currently a three-credit course. We propose making it a one-to-three credit course.

If offered as a one-credit (two-credit) course, the instructor will meet the class one-third (two-thirds) of the normal hours and present about one-third (two-thirds) of the normal material. Since some subjects normally covered in this course might be of more current importance than others, the instructor will have the option to determine which subset of topics will be covered in a particular semester. If an instructor wants to offer the course on a one or two-credit basis, the Department Curriculum Committee will review the proposed syllabus to ensure that the amount of material to be covered is appropriate. The Department of Economics will keep the syllabus on file so that the content of the course is known for any occasion on which it is offered, and will make the syllabus available to students who are considering taking the course.

## Justification for Proposed Change:

With limited faculty resources, we are unable to offer the range of courses we desire. Several of our courses, including this one, have not been taught for several years. By offering the course for less than three credits, we can accomplish two purposes:

- 1. It will increase the diversity of our course offerings. Instead of offering one three-credit course in a single field, we can offer three one-credit courses on different fields. A three-credit course clearly delivers more depth and breadth than a one-credit course, but we do not have the resources to offer all of the three-credit courses we desire. A one-credit course is better than nothing.
- 2. It will provide attractive options for students. With almost every IUP course carrying three credits, it is difficult for students to schedule 13, 14, 16, or 17 credits in a semester. Many students have combed through the Undergraduate Course Schedule in a vain search for a one-credit course to round out their schedule.
