2b. No new or revised courses are included in this proposal.

3. Rationale for Change

The reason and impetus for this change is simply to repackage the old business pre-law program into a new required 120 credit program while still maintaining the required existing university wide pre-law curriculum. Indeed, without a revision, it would be impossible for any business major to complete a pre-law program in 120 credits.

Part III Implementation

- 1. The proposed revision will not affect students in the existing program.
- 2. Unless a material increase of pre-law students appears in the College of Business (which is not anticipated), faculty resources are adequate. Keep in mind, no new courses are being proposed.
- 3. Other resources are adequate.
- 4. As a result of this revised 120 credit business pre-law major, there probably will be an increase in the number of students. The anticipation is that more students will elect the revised program as a double major due to more overlap of curricula particularly with accounting, finance, and economics. However a material increase in the number of students is not expected. Thus, the Department of Finance and Legal Studies, which employs the business law faculty, which have in the past performed the pre-law advising, should have minor, if any, adjustments to the proposed revision.

Part IV Periodic Assignment

1. Describe the evaluation plan.

Regular assessment of the program will be conducted by external and internal evaluators. Internally the Legal Studies faculty will be primarily responsible for program evaluation on an annual basis. A database of student input will be established and maintained; especially of graduates achieving a law related job or admission to law school. Coordination with other pre-law programs shall be maintained.

For individual courses, the instructor of each class will be evaluated following Collective Bargaining Agreement criteria and recently updated IUP student evaluation process.

External evaluation will be conducted by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB) periodically.

Specify the frequency of evaluation.

An internal evaluation of the program and courses will be conducted annually by the department faculty. The AACSB conducts interim periodic reviews from time to time and performs a full accreditation review every five years.
