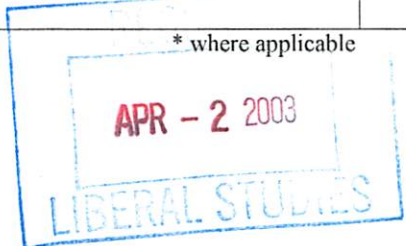

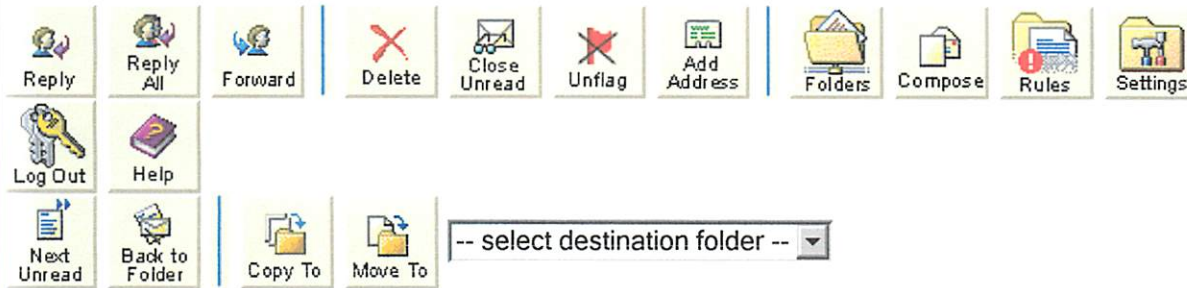

Good morning,

I am writing to ask your support in deleting **COSC/IFMG/BTED 101 Microbased Computer Literacy** from the Interior Design (ID) curriculum to comply with the state mandate of 120 s.h. Currently COSC/BTED/IFMG 101 is a required LS Elective and a pre-requisite for the computer aided design (CAD) course, INDS 218 Drafting for Construction II. COSC/BTED/IFMG 101 was added to the curriculum in 1997 primarily to give our students a general understanding of the computer before taking CAD, whereas the database and spreadsheet components of COSC/IFMG/BTED 101 were never a high priority. Conditions have changed since 1997 and the ID faculty now find that our students (approximately 170 majors) are sufficiently familiar with computers upon admission to IUP to succeed in INDS 218 without taking COSC/IFMG/BTED
