Narrative Catalog Description:	Provides coursework focusing on support and services to families with children, birth to age three, with developmental delays and disabilities. Early Intervention services meet the developmental needs of the child in one or more of the following areas: physical development; cognitive development; communication development; social and emotional development; and adaptive development.

Student Learning Outcomes for Minor or Track	Students will: 1. Define developmental delays and disabilities in children from birth to age three. 2. Compare and contrast support services and resources available for children with developmental delays. 3. Identify adaptive procedures to enhance the child's development. 4. Develop strategies to respect families' strengths, values and diversity. 5. Locate resources and services to increase families' independence and competencies.
REPLEM VENDE	Rationale for Proposal
Why is this track/minor being proposed?	The primary objectives of the Child Development and Family Relations Program are to prepare professionals to administer and/or work in programs that entail all aspects of child development and family relations, to teach at the adult level, or to administer human service agencies at federal, state or local levels. A rapidly growing field in child development is Early Intervention. Early intervention focuses on providing services to children with certain developmental disabilities or delays. An early intervention specialist usually works with such children from infancy to age three. Most professionals in the field agree that children attain

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	better developmental outcomes when they receive a diagnosis and services as early as possible, thus, a focus on working with children and families from birth onward. The CDFR Program has one course, CDFR 315 Introduction to Early Intervention. This track will expand our offerings and better prepare our students for work in the early intervention field.
What role, if any, does it serve the college/university above and beyond the role it serves in the department?	An Early Intervention Track through the Child Development and Family Relations Program will be the first program at IUP to focus solely on children from birth to age three and their families to address developmental disabilities and delays. This track will be an area where IUP faculty and students have the expertise that is needed in the field of child development and family relations.
