NEW CATALOG DESCRIPTIONS

MS 101 American Military History (1650-1920) 2c - 11 - 2 sh

A study of the relationship and impact of warfare and military forces on the development of America. This includes the interaction of American military forces in war and peace on the social, economic, and technological development of the United States as well as a study of strategy, tactics, and personalities involved in major wars. Also, see Leadership Laboratory.

MS 102 American Military History (1920-Present) 2c - 11 - 2 sh

A study of the modern evolution of American military institutions and policies and their relationship to society. Included will be studies of major wars, their strategy, and impact as well as the personalities involved. Also, see Leadership Laboratory.

These are restricted to College of Business students and students in programs which designate specific business requirements for admission. All courses at the 300 and 400 level are open only to junior or senior standing. All students, regardless of major or affiliation, must meet course prerequisite requirements in order to be given course.

2c-11-2sh

MS 203 Fundamentals of Tactical Operations,
2c-11-2sh

Techniques of Leadership, and Weapons Characteristics
Organization, techniques, resources, and capabilities involved in conducting small unit tactical operations. Emphasis is on leadership, organization, and management techniques needed to cause a group of people to accomplish specific objectives. Characteristics of military weapons systems are taught. Students serve as leaders in Leadership Labs.

Summary of Proposed Revisions

The new focus on the American Experience emphasizes American Military History over a worldwide review. This allows the subject to be covered in a relevant way by breaking it into two parts over two semesters for more thorough treatment. MS 102 then can cover 70 years in lieu of 340 years.
