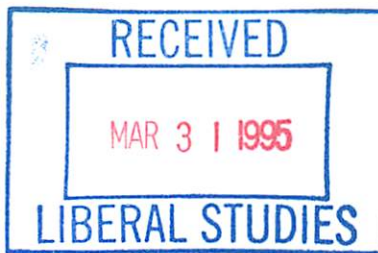

Part II. Description of the Curriculum Change

1. It is proposed that NU 410 Nursing Seminar IV be deleted from the Nursing major.
2. NU 480 is proposed to substitute for this course.
3.
 - a. Changes in existing courses--Deletion of this course and NU 300, 310, and 400 will not change any other existing course in the program with the addition of NU 480. The content of these four courses has been incorporated into the new course.
 - b. Changes in the program--Deletion of this course and the other seminar courses will not change the credit total for the program. The new course offers the same credit.
 - c. Changes for currently enrolled students--Students currently enrolled in the Upper Division of the Nursing Major will begin to take NU 480 in the Fall Semester, 1995 pending approval. Senior nursing Majors only need two sections of this course since they already have taken NU 300 and 310. Students are required to earn a C or better grade in each seminar section they take. Students who earn a D or F grade must register for and successfully complete another section of seminar by earning a C or better grade. Students do not need to repeat the same seminar, but may take a new title.

COURSE TITLE:	NU 410 Seminar IV
CREDITS:	1 Semester hour
PLACEMENT:	Level IV, Spring Semester 1995
TIME ALLOTMENT:	1 Class hour
COURSE OVERVIEW:	A seminar course which provides a forum for the exploration and discussion of historical, ethical, legal, social and political issues which affect nursing and health care. Emphasis is placed on the development of professional values, critical thinking, decision making and communication skills.
TEACHING METHODS:	Literature review, discussion, written position and reaction papers, multi-media and oral presentations.
COURSE OBJECTIVES:	Upon completion of NU 410, the student will: 1. Explore and explain the changes in nursing education through history. (Program Objectives #3 and 7) 2. Analyze the ethical issues related to role conflict in nursing. (Program Objective #2, 3 and 7) 3. Explain the legal bases and implications for nursing practice that rest in nurse practice acts. (Program Objectives #3 and 7) 4. Discuss nursing's professional responsibility in relation to the problem of homelessness. (Program Objectives #2, 3 and 7) 5. Propose strategies for political action in nursing that may affect governmental policy. (Program Objectives #3 and 7) 6. Incorporate evidence of critical thinking, decision making and professional values in written and oral assignments. (Program Objectives #3 and 7)
REQUIRED TEXTS:	Current literature in professional journals and publications.

I. Catalog Description

NU 480 Seminar in Nursing:	1 credit
Behavioral Issues in Chronic Illness	1 lecture hour
	1c-01-1c

Prerequisites: NU 280, NU 285

A seminar which focuses on the adult with chronic illness. Certain concepts will be explored such as compliance with medical regimen, quality of life, and lifestyle changes. A behavioral focus will be utilized. Ethical issues will also be discussed along with the role of the nurse in dealing with the patient who is chronically ill.

I. Catalog Description

NU 480 Seminar in Nursing:	1 credit
Nursing in the Informatics Age	1 lecture hour
	1c-01-1c

Prerequisites: NU 280, NU 285

Suggested: previous computer or word processing experience.

A seminar which provides a forum for the exploration and discussion of issues relevant to the professional nurse. Emphasis is placed on the development of professional values, critical thinking, decision-making, and communication skills. This seminar will introduce and familiarize nursing students with the past, present, and potential impact of informatics on the professional nurse. This seminar will allow students to understand issues related to the use of computers by nurses in practice, management, professional development and research. Students will begin practicing with computer applications.

II. Course Objectives

1. Utilize critical thinking skills to analyze the influence of computers on nursing.
2. Use decision making skills to evaluate select computer resources/applications.
3. Explore the past, present and future trends in nursing informatics.
4. Refine written and verbal communication skills through course assignments.
5. Investigate research and review professional literature related to computer application in nursing.
6. Examine the relationship between professional nursing values and personal feelings toward computers.
7. Describe the contributions nursing informatics can make on nursing practice, nursing management, professional development and nursing research.
8. Discuss emerging trends in informatics and their potential impact on the profession of nursing.

IV. Evaluation Methods

Students will be evaluated on their ability to interact with the computer through demonstration and "hands on" assignments. Students will complete the following equally weighted graded activities and all written assignments must be completed with computer assistance (word processing or submitted electronically).

- 25% Analysis Paper--
 Critique a specific application package used in nursing practice, management, professional development or research.
 Describe the application package you reviewed.
 Discuss the advantages and disadvantages of the reviewed package.
 Identify problems that nurses may encounter in accessing and implementing the reviewed package.
- 25% VAX Notes conference discussion entry
 Submit 4 VAX computer conference notes that address issues related to nursing informatics.
- 25% Email entry describing Internet surfing experience
- 25% In class assignments and class participation based on weekly topic readings.
