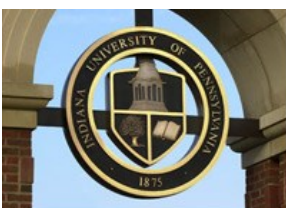
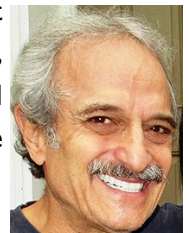

Dr. Marshak Since the last newsletter, I have been immersed in writing a book entitled: *Going Solo while Raising Children with Disabilities*. It will be published by Woodbine House in May 2015 but turned out to be more challenging than I had anticipated. Part of this was because I interviewed more than forty parents under all kinds of unusual life circumstances and analyzed the results of about 150 surveys. It was also the first book I have written without a co-author. As much as I have been complaining about the work (to anyone who would listen), it was the most interesting project I have done. My favorite part was visiting Travis Air Force Base in California to interview parents raising children with a range of serious illnesses. Many were coping with rare and life-threatening disorders while their partner was deployed overseas for a year or more. While there, I did a workshop for them that focused on being a couple under these extremely difficult conditions.

It has also been great fun for me to continue to be the professional advisor of the Friendship Circle of Pittsburgh, an inclusion group for youth with and without disabilities. During the past eight years, I have seen it grow from a membership of 37 to the current 440 youth. The next year will be very exciting since we are moving into our own building in Squirrel Hill. This will enable even more movement towards our goals of increased community inclusion for people with disabilities.

On the personal side, I am looking forward to a March trip to San Ignacio in Baja Mexico. I will be staying at a small tented camp which is one of the best places in the world to watch whales since they come to this area to give birth. They say that you hear the whales breathe at night since they hang out in the waters near the camp. My fingers are crossed.

Dr. John Worzbyt, Professor Emeritus

I am now in the process of completely revamping the Quarterbacks of Life Student Success & Leadership Program which will go online once the new website that is being designed is completed.

I also worked on a Whiteboard script narrated by Rocky Blier introducing the Quarterbacks of Life Student Success & Leadership Program. Everything I have mentioned is on the Beating the Odds Foundation current website including the NASA televised program and the Whiteboard presentation.

We continue to work with NASA and are planning additional work with the Army which is yet to be approved. We did have a grant from WalMart this past year and continue to work with them as well.

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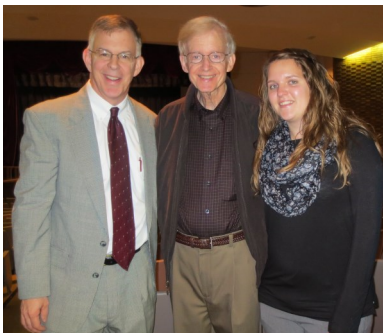
CCTS to Host Dr. Ronald Beghetto

The IUP Center for Counselor Training and Services (CCTS) will be hosting its Spring 2015 workshop, entitled **Reclaiming Creativity in the Everyday Classroom**, with creativity expert **Dr. Ronald Beghetto**. This one-day workshop will be held on **Friday, March 6, at the Westmoreland Intermediate Unit in Greensburg, PA.**

Dr. Beghetto is an Associate Professor of Educational Psychology in the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut and a foremost expert on creativity in education. He is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association (Div. 10), and the Editor-in-Chief for the *Journal of Creative Behavior*. He has also received numerous awards for his research and teaching. His research focuses on creativity in educational settings in examining how teacher and student creativity are sometimes inadvertently suppressed as well as how they can be incorporated into the everyday classroom.

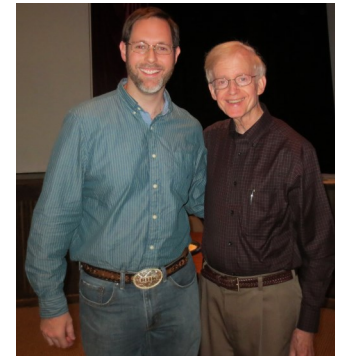

CCTS Host Dr. Garry Landreth

On October 17, the Center for Counselor Training and Services hosted a workshop on play therapy featuring Dr. Garry Landreth, one of the premier figures in play therapy. Dr. Landreth is a Regents Professor in the Department of Counseling and founder of the Center for Play Therapy at the University of North Texas and a frequent speaker at play therapy conferences around the world.

He discussed the four healing messages needed by children; three steps in therapeutic limit-setting; essential dimensions that facilitate change in children; and characteristics of themes in children's play. The workshop was attended by nearly 90 people, including students, alumni, and professionals from as far away as Ohio and Maryland.

Act 31 Child Abuse—Required Training for LPC's

Effective January 1st, 2015, all LPCs in the state of Pennsylvania will be required to complete a new Board Approved Act 31 Child Abuse Recognition and Reporting training prior to license renewal.

The University of Pittsburgh developed a free online training module which can be accessed through the following link:

[Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse: Mandated and Permissive Reporting in Pennsylvania Online Training](#)

This training module, once completed, will be linked directly to each applicant so the state will have immediate verification of completion. It was recommended that people complete the process in advance of renewal, as the system may become overloaded as renewal deadlines are grouped by professions (e.g., all LPCs have a Feb. 28th renewal date).

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Doctoral program in Counselor Education & Supervision

The Counseling Department is excited to announce our decision to pursue a doctoral program in Counselor Education and Supervision. We have completed the first step in the process, the Letter of Intent. The next steps include an extensive program proposal complete with number of credits, curriculum design, and course sequence. Consistent with the other programs in the Department, the doctoral program will also pursue CACREP accreditation. While it is nearly impossible to predict a timeline, the faculty is hopeful that the program will be approved and accepting application for the Fall 2016 semester. We thank alumni for encouraging us to continue to grow and will keep you updated as we progress through the process.
