
Music is alive and well here at IUP and we have had the enduring support of our college and university administration, despite reduced or flat funding from the state government. Recent music graduates have

DiCicco Room Named

The Indiana University of Pennsylvania Board of Trustees approved the naming of the large instrumental rehearsal room in Cogswell Hall as Daniel DiCicco Hall.

Dr. Daniel DiCicco earned his Bachelor of Science in Music Education from IUP. After earning his Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Michigan, DiCicco joined the IUP faculty in 1956 and served as director of the IUP Marching Band, Wind Ensemble, Mellowmen, and Concert Band.

Since the renovation of Cogswell Hall, DiCicco Hall has been one of the most important rooms in the building. Large ensembles such as the IUP Symphony

Orchestra and the bands rehearse in the space. Because of its resonant acoustics, DiCicco Hall has been used increasingly for concerts and recitals. The Department of Music will hold a room naming ceremony on Saturday, December 6. Visit www.iup. edu/music for more information about the naming and ceremony.

IUP Percussion Alumni attended receptions to honor the induction of Percussion Professor Emeritus, Dr. Gary Olmstead, into the Percussive Arts Society Hall of Fame in November 2013. About thirty attended a dinner reception in Indiana, PA. The photo was taken at the reception following the Awards Ceremony at the Percussive Arts Society International Convention in Indianapolis where over forty alumni and friends were in attendance. There have only been 111 inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame since its inception in 1972. PAS is an international organization of about 8,000 mem-

bers and includes all aspects of percussion. Dr. Gary Olmstead also received the 2014 Medal of Merit Award from Ohio University. The Medal of Merit

Award is awarded to alumni who have achieved distinction and outstanding professional accomplishments in their chosen fields. Olmstead served as the Graduate Assistant in Percussion while enrolled in the Master of Fine Arts degree program at Ohio University from 1964-66. Dr. Olmstead also holds the Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Michigan and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music. Olmstead developed the percussion program at IUP during his 37 year tenure. Other awards and honors include the Achievement in Music Award from Ohio University, the Distinguished Faculty Award for Teaching from IUP, and the Lifetime Achievement in Education Award from the Percussive Arts Society (PAS).

The IUP Music Department hosted the

Allegheny Chapter of the American Musicological Society's Fall Meeting on Saturday, October 19, 2013. Eight presenters from around the region gave papers on subjects ranging from folk tunes to electronic

dance music.

IUP's Festival of Women Composers was held on February 13–15. Singer/songwriter Judith Coe was the festival's resident artist/composer.



The IUP Department of Music is pleased to announce the installation of the Ronald G. Pogorzelski and Lester D. Yankee Memorial Organ, leased to Indiana University of Pennsylvania by the American Guild of Organists. The IUP Saxophone Studio welcomed back alumnus Justin Polyblank and the Barkada Saxophone Quartet, winners of the Gold Medal Prize at the Fischoff Chamber Music Competition. They presented a recital and masterclass on October 9th and performed a concerto with the Wind Ensemble at the 2014 Homecoming Concert.

Dr. Christine Clewell, Dr. Mary Logan Hastings and Dr. Linda Jennings supported the IUP Music Department's international exchange program with the University of the Americas in Puebla, Mexico (UDLAP) through a visit to UDLAP in April 2014. During their visit they presented a chamber music program for voice, cello and piano including a new composition "Vocalise" for voice and piano by IUP

music professor Dr. David Martynuik. In addition they collaborated with UDLAP faculty and students in chamber music performances on the 11th Chamber Music Festival Camerlia hosted by UDLAP. Drs. Clewell and Hastings also worked with UDLAP students in teaching master classes. In a reciprocal visit, UDLAP faculty members Juan Hermida, cellist, and Misa Ito, pianist, visited IUP to work with music students and present concerts featuring works by cello and piano as well as collaborative chamber works with IUP faculty members Dr. Stanley Chepaitis, Dr. Mary Logan Hastings, Dr. Linda Jennings and IUP cello students. Mr. Hermida and Ms. Ito also presented a collaborative chamber music program with Dr. Chepaitis for Indiana Area School District students. This is the second faculty exchange of this international program with UDLAP. The exchange was coordinated by Dr. Jennings who initiated the program in 2009.

This year marks the 10th Anniversary of the IUP String Project in continuing its mission of providing quality string education for students in the area and mentoring future string educators. Several special events are being planned throughout the year to highlight this important milestone. The 10th Anniversary Event will be held on Saturday, April 25, 2015 in Cogswell Hall. All IUP Music Department alumni are invited to attend an day-long event featuring IUP alumnus Scott Laird and IUP professors Dr. Stanley Chepaitis, and Dr. Linda Jennings. The day will feature rehearsals and a performance by the IUP Alumni String Orchestra led by Stanley Chepaitis and Scott Laird. For more information on these events go to www. iup.edu/stringproject. Highlights from last year include sponsoring, along with the IUP Music Department and College of Fine Arts, the first IUP Cello/String Festival in October 2013. The Festival featured internationally acclaimed cellist Matt Turner who led sessions and performances on alternative styles throughout the day for grade school through college age cellists as well as string and cello teachers in the region.

Legendary trumpeter Doc Severinsen opened the 2014–15 Lively Arts Ovations season on Tuesday, September 16, with an incredible show that featured IUP faculty, alumni, and students including Alexander Price (guitar), Richard Firestone (saxophone), and Nick Adams (bass). In addition, 21 students from the IUP Chorale were selected to sing "Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child" with Kansas-City based singer Vanessa Thomas.

Faculty Notes

Dr. Ryan Beeken, director of Choral Studies, gave several presentations and served as guest conductor for numerous festivals during the 2013-2014 academic year. In August he presented an invited clinic at the Pennsylvania American Choral Directors Association annual conference, held in Elizabethtown, PA.

Dr. Beeken conducted the Southern Invitational Choral Conference hosted by the University of Southern Mississippi in September 2013, and in November he led the Mucho Macho Men's Festival, a choral festival for young men in Western Pennsylvania. In addition, Beeken conducted the Armstrong and Indiana County High School Honor Choirs, the Blair County Junior High Honor Choir, the PMEA District 3 Honor Choir, and the PMEA Region 3 Honor Choir.

Dr. Beeken was invited to spend a threeday residency, from January 14-16, 2014, at Ohio State University. During the residency, Beeken conducted the Symphonic Choir, University Singers, and Women's Glee Club in rehearsals and taught undergraduate choral conducting and secondary choral methods.

In March, Dr. Beeken was invited to serve as one of 12 presenters at the Southwest American Choral Directors Association Division Convention. Beeken's session,

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entitled "Conductor 'Creature' Vs. Conductor-Teacher: Empowering Singers Through Authenticity in the Choral Rehearsal," was designed to illuminate the dynamic relationship between the chorus and the conductor-teacher.

Dr. Zach Collins traveled to Moscow, Russia, in January 2014 to perform at the Moscow Tchaikovsky Conservatory. Dr. Collins performed in a concert given in memory of Alexey Lebedev, the first professor of tuba at the Moscow Conservatory. He was invited by Professor Yuri Larin, the current professor of tuba and former student of Lebedev.

Dr. Kevin Eisensmith was honored at the 2014 International Trumpet Guild Conference, held in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, as one of three recipients of the ITG Award of Merit. The Award of Merit is one of two lifetime achievement awards created by the International Trumpet Guild and is given "to those individuals who have made substantial contributions to the art of trumpet playing through performance, teaching, publishing, research, composition, and/ or support of the goals of the International Trumpet Guild." To date, only 35 individuals have been selected for this recognition.

Dr. Jacob Ertl, assistant professor of piano, performed a recital featuring Beethoven's *Sonata Op. 90*, Rzewski's *Winnsboro Cotton Mill Blues*, two pieces from Liszt's *Years of Pilgrimmage*, and a transcription of Stravinsky's *Firebird* on the Johnstown Concert Series at the First Presbyterian Church on October 12, 2013. Ertl's participation also included a master class for local piano students.

Dr. Ertl was a featured artist at the Dakota Sky International Piano Festival, held June 13–24, 2014, in Sioux Falls, S.D. While in residence, Ertl performed a solo piano recital in the Recital Series.

Faculty Notes

Jack Stamp Retirement

Dr. Jack Stamp will be retiring at the end of the Spring 2015 semester. A final gala concert weekend has been planned beginning with performances by the IUP Symphony Band and Concert Band on Friday, April 24th. Dr. Stamp, known for his involvement in the commissioning of new works, will present his final concert with the IUP Wind Ensemble featuring world premiere performances of works by Anthony O'Toole, Molly Joyce, Carl Holmquist, and Daniel French. A highlight of the concert will be the world premiere of "A Jack Stamp Suite", with movements by contributing composers Bruce Yurko, Andrew Boysen, Timothy Broege, Timothy Mahr, Mark Camphouse, and Dwayne Milburn. That concert is Saturday, April 25th. The weekend will conclude with a performance by the Keystone Wind Ensemble on Sunday, April 26th at 2 p.m.

In September 2013 IUP cello professor Dr. Linda Jennings collaborated with pianist Dr. Chindarat Charoewongse, Professor at the University of Central Oklahoma (UCO), to present a program of American music including new works by composers Daniel Perlongo, Samuel Magrill, and Keith White at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. In November 2013 she performed on a faculty chamber music concert and presented master classes at the UCO. In June 2014 she performed with the Arcadia Trio in concerts featuring Olivier Messiaen's Quartet for the End of Time in Fort Erie, Ontario, Canada and at the State University of New York in Fredonia. She also participated as co-organizer and co-presenter at a session in the ASTA national conference March 5, 2014 in Louisville, KY, entitled "Implementing ASTACAP."

In July and August of 2014, Dr. Jennings worked with the Bangkok Symphony Orchestra Foundation as Artistic Director in developing and leading an intensive three-week workshop for young high school and college cellists as well leading cello teachers, and professional cellists. This was the first program of this kind in Thailand. The final concert featured two world premieres of works for solo cello and cello ensemble commissioned specifically for this project with Dr. Jennings as soloist - Chiaroscuro by IUP's Stanley Chepaitis and Song without Words by leading Thai cellist Kittikuhn Sodprasert. The program also highlighted IUP faculty member Mary Logan Hastings in a performance of Hector Villa Lobos' Bachianas Brasileiras #5 for solo soprano and cello ensemble. Dr. Jennings also performed as a member of the Bangkok Symphony Orchestra for an all-Mozart concert featuring internationally renowned guest conductor/violinist Dmitry Sitkovetsky. Dr. Jennings presented a final weeklong workshop and concert for the Chiang Rai Youth Orchestra program in northern Thailand. This project was supported by a \$10,000 award from the PASSHE Faculty Professional Development Council as well as the IUP Music Department and College of Fine Arts.

This past April, **Dr. Jacob Ertl** premiered a new composition for solo piano by **Dr. John Levey** at the University of Pittsburgh at Bradford. The composition, entitled *Cycles*, was commissioned by UPB in celebration of their fiftieth anniversary.

Dr. Carl Rahkonen, Music Librarian, was hired by Michigan State University to conduct fieldwork among Finnish American musicians and instrument builders in the state of Michigan. In July he interviewed, photographed, and recorded musicians in Oakland, near Detroit, and in the Upper Peninsula villages of Toivola, Covington, and Aura. His fieldwork will be archived at the Michigan State Museum in East Lansing.

Dr. Henry Wong Doe gave a masterclass, private lessons, and a recital in Singapore and Malaysia during Thanksgiving break, 2013. As a newly appointed examiner for the Ars Nova Conservatory Singapore, Wong Doe's visit aimed to strengthen the new partnership between IUP and the Ars Nova Conservatory.

In April 2014 Dr. Wong Doe premiered a chamber work by composer and Penn State Altoona faculty member Timothy Melbinger at the Misciagna Center for Performing Arts at Penn State Altoona.

Dr. Wong Doe performed Beethoven's Emperor Concerto with the Christchurch Symphony Orchestra in Christchurch, New Zealand, on May 24 and 25, 2014. This concert was held in the Charles Luney Auditorium, St. Margaret College, Christchurch. In the summer of 2014 he released his second solo album, *Landscape Preludes*, on Rattle Records. The disc is a set of 12 solo piano works by contemporary New Zealand composers, all reflective of the New Zealand landscape. During its first week of release, the New Zealand Herald critic William Dart gave the disc a five-star rating.

Dr. Keith Young was the guest conductor/ clinician at the TMEA Region 5 Jazz Ensemble Festival in Dallas, Texas this past year. He also performed on a program at IUP and West Liberty College with a saxophone quartet he formed including three IUP alumni: Christopher Barrick ('01); Benjamin Saylor ('10); and Michael Menzietti ('05). This quartet presented all jazz saxophone quartet literature, including two arrangements written by Dr. Young during his sabbatical.

Ensemble Notes

On Saturday, October 26, 2013, the **University Chorale** performed for the American Choral Directors Association State Fall Conference. The University Chorale was one of two university ensembles selected through a blind, peer-reviewed process to perform for Pennsylvania choral professionals. The Chorale was joined by Music Department faculty members Jacob Ertl, Stanley Chepaitis, and Jack Scandrett. The department and ensemble were very well received. In fact, one choral educator remarked "the sleeping giant has awoken!"

Zach Collins and students of the **IUP Tuba and Euphonium Studio** traveled to Bloomington, IN, to present invited performances at the 2014 International Tuba Euphonium Conference (ITEC). The IUP Tubaphonium Ensemble performed a concert alongside the studios from

Marshall University, and the Eastman and Hartt Schools of Music. The students from these schools also combined to perform the premiere of Barbara York's *Dark Chocolate Suite*, a piece that IUP co-commissioned along with the other institutions involved in the concert.

The **IUP Wind Ensemble** has been invited to be the "featured ensemble" at the 2015 USBands Festival being held at Heinz Hall on May 18th. The concert will be open to the public. More specific information will be on the website once it becomes available.

Library Notes



Edward Sims

Edward Sims, a Distinguished Alumnus of IUP, visited the Orendorff Music Library and the Music Department on August 18th. Dr. Sims, a 1953 graduate in music from IUP, went on to earn his Doctorate in Music Education from the University of Michigan. Sims's doctoral dissertation was on "The History of the

Music Department at the Indiana University of Pennsylvania and its Contributions to Music Education." This work has been vital in documenting the history of the IUP Music Department from its beginnings until around 1965. Dr. Sims, an outstanding pianist, spent the largest portion of his teaching career as a music professor at Slippery Rock University.

Twenty years ago Dr. Sims donated a set of ethnic musical instruments to the Music Library which he collected from around the world. The collection has instruments representing every continent, including Africa, Asia and South America. Some of the more important instruments include a Philippine kawayan (a type of large bamboo tuba), and a ninefoot Swiss Alpenhorn. Since the time of Sims's donation, others have donated instruments to the collection, making it truly substantial. Five years ago, Sims donated a 100 year-old Edison disk player to the Music Library. It is a Model H-19 "Hepplewhite" with a fleur-de-lis grille. He included a second portable Edison player and eighty-seven disks. The Music Library is currently featuring a display of selected instruments from the Edward R. Sims Collection.

The composition students also write pieces for the group which are premiered at a special concert.
