Welcome Class of 2024!

The SAHE department welcomed the Class of 2024 on August 24th, 2022 during the annual Kick-Off program. This year, Kick-Off was divided into the faculty-led portion held at Stouffer Hall on August 24th, with the social events planned by the Associates for Student Development (ASD) following on Saturday, August 27th.

During the faculty-led portion of Kick-Off, the first year cohort got to hear words of advice for the start of their graduate school journey. They were welcomed by Dr. Sue Rieg, Interim Dean of the College of Education and Communications, and Dr. Thomas Segar, Vice President for Student Affairs. Chair's Corner

Greetings from Stouffer Hall! After more than two academic years significantly impacted by the world-wide COVID pandemic, this academic year feels very different: classes are in person and important SAHE traditions are also being offered face-to-face. It also feels strange to begin the academic year without Dr. John Mueller as a member of the faculty—he retired after 23 years as a full-time faculty member over the summer and was the longest serving faculty member in the history of the SAHE Program.

Personally this year is different in another way. Margaret, our daughter who many alumni have met over the past 14 years, is now a college freshman. She is enrolled at the University of South Carolina and studying Public Health. She was home recently for fall break and seems to be adjusting well to college. However, it is a very different view of college students than I have had before.



It is hard to believe that almost a month has passed since the SPS/SAHE 50th Anniversary weekend. It was wonderful to reconnect with so many SAHE graduates and former faculty members. For me, clearly the highlight of the entire weekend was Inside the Professors Office—a conversation with Drs. Ron Thomas, Ron Lunardini, and Mimi Benjamin modeled after Inside the Actors Studio so famously hosted by James Liption. We had a very engaging conversation about the history and current status of the SAHE Program. If you were unable to join us last month, I encourage you to watch the video of the program.

With my own research, I have been working on a number of different projects in my role as NASPA Historian. I have succeeded in getting all of the NASPA Conference Proceedings available on-line for researchers. NASPA published conference proceedings until the late 1960s. Another phase of that same effort will be to scan and make available on-line all of the conference programs from the years since. I will also be presenting at NASPA on a project that NASPA worked on with the faculty in the Harvard Graduate School of Business to develop case studies for training student affairs administrators in the 1950s. I have also been working on multiple book chapters: one is focused on legal and ethical issues in academic advising administration and the other is a revision of my student conduct chapter in *Rentz's Student Affairs Practice in Higher Education*.

As I look forward to the spring, I am excited to attend ASCA in Portland, Oregon and NASPA in Boston. We are also co-sponsoring a reception at NASPA with Dr. Tom Segar and the Division of Student Affairs. I hope to see lots of SAHE alumni at both conferences.

I also want to thank the many SAHE alumni who continue to encourage their students to consider the IUP SAHE Program when considering their graduate school options. Please continue to send us your best students.





The Department of Student Affairs in Higher Education is pleased to announce Abreeya (Bree) Darda as the recipient of the Nancy Newkerk Scholarship for 2022.

Bree is a second-year student in the Student Affairs in Higher Education program and serves as a graduate assistant in the Fraternity and Sorority Life Office at IUP. She is the vice president of communications for the Associates for Student Development, a member of the Center for Teaching Excellence Advisory Board, and served as a Crimson Scholars Circle Leadership Program facilitator. Bree also was nominated for the 2022 IUP Distinguished Advisor Award.



One of Bree's nominators stated, "Bree's leadership abilities raise the bar that was set by those who came before her.... The time she

spends helping to develop [students'] skill set speaks to her ability to empower others to achieve their greatest good." Another nominator shared, "[Bree's] commitment to affirming students, particularly students from historically excluded populations, deserves notice."

Since 1999, the Nancy Newkerk Scholarship has been awarded to deserving second-year SAHE graduate students who demonstrate outstanding contributions to college students, student affairs activities, the SAHE department, and the broader higher education community. Newkerk scholarship recipients are selected based on the qualities that reflect Nancy Newkerk's own professional career in student affairs: a collaborative colleague, a student-centered practitioner, and a role model for citizenship and civic responsibility.

SAHE Alumnus Recognized for Outstanding Dissertation



Craig Pickett, Jr., a 2010 graduate of the Student Affairs in Higher Education program, was recently selected by The Southern Association for College Student Affairs as the 2022 Dissertation of the Year Award recipient.

SASCA is a regional and generalist student affairs association that represents 14 southern states and focuses on inclusiveness, professionalism, and collegiality.

Pickett is the Director of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture, where he also completed his Ph.D.

In April 2022, Pickett was awarded the College of Education and Communications' IMPACT Award for the Student Affairs in Higher Education Department. The IMPACT award honors alumni from each department in the college for achievement in their respective fields and the contributions they make to their communities.

Greetings from Germany!

Guten Tag from Berlin, Germany! For my first student affairs job since graduating from SAHE in May of this year, I have the incredible opportunity of working with Northeastern University's N.U.in Program on-site in Berlin as a Global Student Success Coordinator. The N.U.in Program sends cohorts of students abroad every year to locations all over the globe for their very first semester of college. This year's N.U.in Program locations include California, England, Scotland, Ireland, Greece, Italy, Spain, and of course, Germany!

As a new student affairs professional planning to remain in international education, the opportunity to live and work abroad in this capacity is invaluable. Study abroad is a high-impact practice with massive potential for student growth. Working on-site mentoring students participating in an international program better informs my work in the field. Living in Berlin is a highlight in and of itself, as I have countless opportunities to experience a city that is so culturally and historically rich. For example, behind me in the included photo is a mural in the East Side Gallery, an open-air exhibit built onto the longest surviving section of the Berlin Wall. Engaging firsthand with these pieces of Berlin's history is impactful for me personally and is an excellent opportunity to encourage N.U.in students' reflection and growth during this transformative program.

This position is certainly extraordinary in location but is also a unique experience in its wide scope of opportunities. Our on-site staff is fairly small, with a significant duty to support our students through major experiential learning. The program includes 130+ students who are not only facing the transition to the first year of college but also the transition to living in a new country and culture.

Karis Cornelius is a 2022 SAHE graduate. During her time in SAHE, she served as the Graduate Assistant for the IUP College of Education and Communications' Diversity and Inclusion Standing Committee, completed practicum experiences in academic advising, financial aid, and study abroad, and was involved with the Associates for Student Development (ASD) Executive Board. Karis intends to continue her student affairs work in international education. She plans to transition from on-site study abroad support to a position in a study abroad office after returning home to the United States in 2023.

These combined experiences pose an incredible opportunity along with a host of challenges, tasking support staff to take on a variety of roles. An integral part of my role is a live-on component, including a 24/7 on-call rotation. In addition, I am also responsible for planning, executing, and supporting various student programs, mentoring students individually, holding student conduct meetings, and co-advising a student-led Community Council group. Between these duties, I am able to gain experience in international education, residence life, advising, student activities, student conduct, and first-year experience all within the same role, allowing me to explore my interest in international education while also continuing to grow holistically as a student affairs professional.

As my time in Berlin comes to a close, I am grateful for the opportunities of which I have taken advantage to develop such significant hands-on experience in international education. I am confident that this experience will serve me well in my work moving forward in the field.
