Student Government Association Remarks

- Abby Hancox, Student Government Association President
- In response to the off-campus incident of violence on October 8, SGA, in collaboration with GSA, hosted an information session on October 10. Dr. Segar, Michelle Fryling, and Chief Stringer were in attendance to provide information and answer questions students had about the incident.
- The majority of the student concerns revolved around IUP's response to the incident. After the session, I do believe that the students with such concerns were able walk away with a better understanding of IUP emergency response protocol, especially with this incident being off campus.
- Students in attendance expressed interest in active shooter trainings for students, faculty, etc. As such, SGA will be looking to host an active shooter training for students in the future.

Graduate Student Assembly Remarks

- Koga Chilume, Graduate Student Assembly President
- Echoed the information provided by Abby Hancox. GSA will continue to work to provide future additional resources.

Vice President for Student Affairs' Remarks

- Dr. Thomas Segar, Vice President for Student Affairs
- Appreciated students wanting to share their thoughts and feelings regarding the occurrence. Information regarding training from University Police is forthcoming and will focus on keeping the IUP community safe.
- Student Affairs and University Police work hand in hand with other university and community partners to keep the campus community safe.
- The addition of Marketing and Communications with Student Affairs will lead to a great opportunity to enhance the communications sent to the university community.
- Encouraging students to sign-up for <u>Everbridge</u> is an important part of the onboarding process and will continue in the future.

New Business

- A vote was taken to determine preferred meeting method for future meetings. The committee will continue to meet via Zoom.
- Article Discussion <u>Survey: Barriers to college students' campus engagement (insidehighered.com)</u> The article identified advertising (students not being aware of opportunities), conflicts with

days/times of activities and other commitments (often work) as primary barriers from a national survey. It also highlighted some of the benefits of on-campus work for students and noted that incentives for attendance/participation can be helpful. The article also indicated that students want in-person activities as opposed to virtual, and their primary goal of participation in co-curricular involvement is to meet new people.

- Discussion of barriers to engagement and how they impact our students at IUP.
 - Feeling of connectedness.
 - Lack of available time due to needing to work.
 - Some students may feel connected because of their involvement with athletics or other groups.
 - Some students do not feel the need to engage with others because they have found their group.
- How can we help students select a modest number of things to be involved in?
 - Quality vs quantity.
 - 15-20 hours of employment per week is the sweet spot.
 - Need for students to have events where they can bring their friend groups and events where they can meet new friends.
- Advertisement
 - Word of mouth and social media are the main methods as of now.
- Employment
 - Considerations being made to reduce the level of clearance required to be employed on campus. However, one student member indicated that having the clearances as part of that process can be helpful for other activities that require them, like internships.
- Student Affairs Organization Review
 - Dr. Segar shared the organizational structure for Student Affairs to provide context for the committee's work.
