LGBTQIA Support is IUP's all-inclusive umbrella term for anyone who identifies as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer, Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, or Ally--anyone on the rainbow spectrum.



Helpful Terms

"Sex" refers to the biological and physiological characteristics that define men (males) and women (females).

"Gender" refers to the socially constructed roles, behaviors, activities, and attributes that society considers appropriate for men (masculine) and women (feminine).

"Gender identity" is the internal sense of gender which is not visible to others. One's gender identity may or may not align with one's assigned sex at birth.

"Sexual orientation" refers to whom one is sexually attracted. *Gender identity and sexual* orientation may affect one another but they are not the same.

"Trans*" or "Transgender" is an umbrella term for people whose gender identity or expression does not match the gender they were assigned at birth.

"Cisgender" is someone whose gender identity matches the gender assigned at birth.

What should I do if I am harassed or experience discrimination for being a member or ally of the LGBTQIA community?


Know that it is not your fault. IUP has a variety of ways to support you. Please consider reporting what happened to you so that intolerance can be addressed.
