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Welcome to the Winter 2011-12 edition of the Counseling Department newsletter. I always enjoy writing this opening page as it offers me an opportunity to update you on what is happening in the Counseling Department and reminds me of the constant progress from year to year. Under the leadership of Dr. Branthoover this fall, one significant development relates to comprehensive program and curriculum revisions. Faculty have completed multiple curriculum proposals that have resulted in the following changes. Both the MA and MEd programs have been approved by the University Senate to increase to 60 credits and the community counseling program has been renamed "clinical mental health counseling." In addition, the school counseling degree will soon prepare students to be certified K -12. A number of new and revised course proposals have been submitted to the curriculum process allowing both programs to address the changing needs of the professional counselors as well as revised CACREP and PDE standards.

We are very excited to announce our 2nd Celebration Banquet, to be held on April 20, 2012 on the Indiana campus. This will be an evening to showcase and honor recent and past successes of alumni, students, and the Department. See page 6 for complete banquet information and an RSVP. We will also be making our first "Heroes in Helping Awards" at this event saluting youth in grades 6-12 who have demonstrated exemplary involvement in helping activities related to their schools or communities. Application guidelines will appear on the Department of Counseling website; the deadline for applications is March 20, 2012.

Faculty News

Dr. Holly Branthoover was selected for the 2011 Pennsylvania Counselor Association (PCA) President's Award. As she presented the



award, Jen Barna, PCA president, recognized Branthoover for "outstanding dedication" to the organization and for a "long and impressive record of service." Branthoover was also recognized for her role in creating the associa-

tion's first supervision registry, a secure, online registration process to connect highly qualified supervisors with counselors working to become licensed. Dr. Branthoover has served in a number of leadership roles in the PCA, including president-elect, president, past president, and membership committee chairwoman.

In addition, Dr, Branthoover serves as chairwoman of the North Atlantic region of the ACA. In this position, she is a mentor and supporter of more than nine branch counseling associations in the eastern U.S., Europe, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands. Because of her role, she gave a presentation in September at the District of Columbia Counseling Association membership drive and kickoff.

Doctoral Student Instructors: We had doctoral counseling students from Kent State, Duquesne, and Ohio Univ. teaching this year:

Gina Gordon, MEd, NCC, a doctoral candidate in the Counselor Education and Supervision PhD program at Duquesne University, is teaching in our program this year. Gina is an NCC and professional school counselor at Blackhawk Intermediate School. She earned a BA in Elementary and Special Education from Mercyhurst College in 2001, and a MEd degree in School Counseling from Slippery Rock University in 2005. Since 2006, Gina has served as an elementary school counselor in The Blackhawk School District. She is a certified trainer for The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program, and has trained various schools on how to implement this program. Blackhawk Intermediate School's school counseling program received The American School Counselor Association's Recognized ASCA Model Program (RAMP) Award in June 2011.

Dr. Lorraine Guth was one of 12 counselor educators from the United States chosen to be part of the National Board of Certified Counselors (NBCC) Thunder Dragon Institute in Bhutan held in October, 2011. The initiative was designed to help establish the counseling profession in this small landlocked country in South Asia. She spent two weeks providing direct counseling services to Bhutanese students in a local school and also provided training to the principal, teachers, counselors, and students. During the third week, she delivered a presentation on Group Work and Group Counseling Skills at the NBCC International Counseling Conference in Thimphu, Bhutan. She also co-conducted a presentation for the Bhutan Ministry of Education highlighting the work that was done in the schools and recommendations for school counseling in the country. The service work and presentations were well received. This project was made possible by support from the University Senate Research Committee Small Grants Program, President's Supplemental Travel Fund, COE-ET Dean, Graduate School, and Department of Counseling. I am also finishing my third year teaching fellowship at the KSU Counseling and Human Development Center. I'm currently involved with a research team at KSU, and am in the process of starting two studies this upcoming spring semester. I was busy this fall, presenting on my research interest areas at NCA-CES in Nashville, TN, as well as AOCA in Columbus, OH. I anticipate graduating in May 2013 and hope to seek out a tenure-track faculty position at that point. I'm excited to be teaching this spring for another semester at the Penn Center. I have really enjoyed my time working with the students, and have appreciated all of the guidance from those working there. I would like to thank Kim Desmond (my supervisor) as well as the staff and faculty at the Penn Center for the support, consultation, and fielding all of my questions. 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Center for Counseling Training and Services to Offer Dialectical Behavior Therapy Workshop

The IUP Center for Counselor Training and Services (CCTS) will be featuring a workshop on Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) on Friday, **January 27, 2012.** Dr. Safdir Chaudhary will present an "Introduction to Dialectical Behavior Therapy" at the IUP Monroeville Graduate and Professional Center.

Dr. Chaudhary is Medical Director for S'eclairer, an organization devoted to the dissemination of evidence-based practices that is located in Delmont, PA . He is Diplomat of the American Board of Psychiatry & Neurology in General Adult, Addiction, Geriatric and Forensic Psychiatry. He has been practicing psychiatry for the past 20 years and has received two years of intensive training by Behavioral Tech Research, Inc. in learning and implementing DBT.

Kimberly S. Ruth, a Licensed Professional Counselor and a CAC diplomat at S'eclairer, will serve as the co-presenter for the workshop. She graduated from California University of Pennsylvania with an MS in Community Agency Counseling.

The workshop is coordinated by CCTS, an IUP Center created to develop professional workshops and training for clinical mental health counselors and school counseling professionals throughout the region. CCTS is directed by Dr. John McCarthy, professor of Counseling.

School Counselor Professional Development Day

Area professional school counselors attended the ninth annual "School Counselor Professional Development Day" on Friday, December 16 at the Kovalchick Convention and Athletic Complex. The event was financially supported by the IUP College of Education-Educational Technology.


The "Professional Development Day" is an event aimed at recognizing and honoring the work of professional school counselors throughout western Pennsylvania.

The theme for the event this year was "Current Issues in School Counseling: Proving our Worth." The morning segment featured a panel of school counselors discussing contemporary challenges. This was followed by breakout sessions conducted by Counseling faculty and students. These workshops addressed relational aggression; adolescent depression; addressing career issues with students with disabilities, and school-to-work standards.

The afternoon segment was highlighted by a focused presentation on "Proving our Worth," and Ms. Stephanie McHugh, an IUP alum and Guidance Supervisor at Baldwin High School, provided the closing presentation.

Career Counseling Expert to Speak at IUP

Dr. John Krumboltz, a pioneer and leading figure in career counseling, will offer a one-day workshop entitled, "Helping to Create a Meaningful Life in a Difficult Economy through Career Counseling." The workshop is sponsored by the IUP Center for Counselor Training and Services and will be held on Friday, April 20, at the Kovalchick Convention and Athletic Complex.



Dr. Krumboltz is a professor in the School of Edu-

cation at Stanford University and has taught there since 1961. He became a full professor in 1966.

For more than 50 years, he has been an international scholar and leader in the field. His research in career development, behavioral counseling interventions, and social learning theory in career development represented groundbreaking work. He has authored or co-authored over 200 publications.

The American Counseling Association designated him a "Living Legend in Counseling" in 2004. Two years later, Dr. Krumboltz was given the Outstanding Achievement Award from his alma mater, the University of Minnesota, where he received his Ph.D. degree in Educational Psychology in 1955.

His many other honors include the American Psychological Association (APA) Award for Distinguished Professional Contributions and the Leona Tyler Award from APA's Division 17 (Counseling Psychology).

Dr. John McCarthy, CCTS Director and a professor in Counseling, expressed excitement about the event. "To have a presenter of Dr. Krumboltz's stature to conduct a CCTS workshop is a true honor," McCarthy said. "He is a legendary figure in the profession." 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IUP Counseling Department Alums Share their Journey as Doctoral Students

Michael Watterson (MA, 2011); doctoral student at Carlow University

The process of getting into a doctorate program is exhausting at times. It was difficult to be working full time, in the masters program at IUP and applying for programs at the same time. My desire to continue my education came wanting more flexibility in my career. I want to continue to provide direct counseling, as well as being able to teach and supervise. I applied to only two programs as I spent much time examining the many programs available and determining what type of program I would want to attend. Eventually, I chose a counseling psychology PsyD program due to the emphasis on the practical application of skills rather than a focus on academia and research. After narrowing down the programs from PhD to PsyD, I then decided to apply to counseling psychology programs rather than clinical psychology. I liked the emphasis on wellness and strength based therapies rather than a deficit or pathological focus that many clinical psychology programs utilize. After the long application process, I was able to accept an offer to study at Carlow University, in Pittsburgh. The program is fairly new and just received APA accreditation. Currently I am in my first year at Carlow. The program is 3 years of course work and a final year for dissertation and internship. My goal is to work directly with clients, either in a community mental health/drug and alcohol agency or possibly a university counseling center. I would also like to teach on a limited basis sometime in the future. Due to just recently entering the program, I have had very limited opportunities so far; however, during the next year years, I will have the opportunity to participate in four different practica experiences at agencies, hospitals and college counseling centers throughout the area. Megan Michalak (MA, 2010); doctoral student at Idaho State University

Hi Everybody, My name is Megan Michalak and I graduated from Indiana University of Pennsylvania with my masters in Community Counseling in 2010. Since then, I have moved to Idaho and I am currently pursuing my counselor education degree at Idaho State University. Five years ago, I would never have guessed I would be living in Idaho, but working towards a PhD is something I have considered since I was in my undergraduate program. The program here at ISU is 3 years and I am currently in my second year. This is a year jam packed with important milestones (in February I will be taking my comprehensive exams and I will begin writing my dissertation over the holiday break) and although it is stressful, I know that by enduring this year I will get where I want to be. There are number of experiences that contributed to my journey into a doctoral program-the most important being my mentors. I had the great honor of receiving a graduate assistantship with Dr. Lorraine Guth. Dr. Guth was not only willing to explore my thoughts & feelings regarding counselor education, but she also had an instrumental role in shaping who I am as a person. I also had the fortune of working with a former faculty member, Dr. Kirsten Murray, who was the first to allow me to discuss what a PhD program would look like for me. She gave me the space to struggle with the decision between a counselor education program and a counseling psychology program. It is my passion for counseling and the great experiences I had with Dr. Guth, Dr. Murray, and the other faculty members at IUP that helped me discover that I wanted to become a counselor educator (and not a counseling psychologist). In addition to finding a mentor, it was helpful for me to participate in local and national conferences, both as a participant and a presenter. I was able to network, build my resume, and most importantly get experiences that helped to inform me about what it is like to be in a PhD program and be a counselor educator. Scholarship is something that is very important to me and it was fostered by the support I received in the department. There are certainly days where I want to pull my hair out, hide, and cry, but I have never questioned whether the decision to pursue a career in counselor education was right for me. Knowing that I get to support students, advocate for counselors, contribute to my profession through scholarship, and make a difference in my community makes the stressful days much easier to handle. Jennifer Pfeuffer (MA, 2007); doctoral student at Carlow University

After graduating from IUP's M.A. Community Counseling program, I decided to spend a few (more) years working in the mental health field. This included working as a Behavioral Specialist Consultant/ Mobile Therapist for BHRS, a Family Intervention Specialist at a residential treatment facility and as a Mental Health Therapist at WPIC's Community Treatment Team. While the experiences were valuable, I continued to desire more. It was simple for me, I was just not done learning. The field of psychology is so broad and I wanted to be more specialized as well.

Throughout my time at IUP, I sought guidance from several professors, including Dr. McCarthy and Dr. Bruno and they were wonderful! They took the time to discuss the options available to me after graduation. They both supported the option to continue my education and obtain a doctorate in psychology.

Over the course of a year, I devoted time to learning about the different PhD and PsyD programs and weighing the pros and cons. I chose Carlow University for several reasons. The professional and personable faculty was inviting from day one. Their PsyD in Counseling Psychology was a solid program and it would allow me to gain the education that I wanted and still be able to stay local. Carlow also was recently APA accredited, which means that further doors will open in terms of professional connections and practicum/internship sites. I am a member of both APA and PPA, and serve as PPA's Graduate State Advocacy Coordinator.

I was awarded a Graduate Assistantship during my first year at Carlow, which included teaching the undergraduate course "Introduction to Psychology". I am currently in my second year of Carlow's PsyD program and continue to teach several undergraduate courses in psychology and counseling. In additional to teaching, I am currently in my first practicum placement at Children's Hospital, in the Transplant Psychology Unit. I provide therapy to children and families pre/post transplants, along with conducting transplant evaluations. This experience has been rewarding in many ways. My hope is to secure my second practicum experience at The Watson Institute or similar placement where I can continue to work with children with special needs.

I have also recently identified my dissertation topic as well. I will be using the MACI assessment with the High Functioning Autism/Aspergers population and assessing if a repeated "personality type" emerges alongside the predictable behavioral symptoms. I have a very strong interest in personality assessments and my goal is to incorporate them into both my dissertation and continued work as a clinician.

I have another year and a half of coursework, and then my (final) fourth year is devoted to an internship and dissertation. Ultimately, my final goal would be to diagnose and provide psychological treatment to children. I would enjoy incorporating personality/IQ assessments, CBT and play therapy into such treatment.

Teri Madura (MA, 2005); doctoral student at The University of Akron

I am currently a pre-doctoral psychology intern with the Vanderbilt University – Department of Veterans Affairs Professional Psychology Consortium. This is part of the final stages to completing a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology. My path to getting here was slightly abnormal, but I can say for sure that I would not have changed a thing.

I received my Master's degree in Community Counseling from IUP in August 2005. I had been working at a nearby community mental health agency full-time as I was completing my Master's and they offered me a position as an outpatient therapist upon degree completion. I had always wanted to pursue a doctoral degree, but I needed a break from school and I was happy working there. After several months, I decided to apply to a few programs and just see what happened. I was unsure if I wanted to pursue counseling or clinical psychology programs, so I decided to apply to both. (I am a little biased at this point, but the difference I have witnessed between the two programs is that counseling programs tend to focus more on multicultural issues and strengths-based concepts, whereas clinical programs follow more closely to the medical model. In the end, we more or less end up with the same employment opportunities). This may not have been the most strategic way of pursing higher education, but it worked for me! I ended up getting accepted into the PhD Counseling Psychology program at Gannon University. I was ecstatic!

I began my studies in August 2006 and received experience with individual, group, marriage and family therapy, and assessment. There were so many opportunities to get involved not only within the university, but the community as well.

I assisted with organizing mental health services for men at the local homeless shelter and provided court-ordered group therapy for divorced parents having custody issues. I was also able to complete several research projects and become more familiar with the statistics I had been avoiding for so many years! Unfortunately, in December 2007, the university decided to phase-out my program. I quickly organized myself and began applying to other doctoral programs. Some were sympathetic to my situation, and some were not. I ended up getting accepted to The University of Akron and transferred there in August 2008.

The three years I spent at The University of Akron have been integral to my development as a psychologist. Not only did I actually learn how to analyze and interpret statistics, I was invited to write three book chapters, present at professional conferences and workshops, and work on a psychological committee devoted to the needs of Ohio psychologists. The depth of my abilities to not only value, but to understand how to transform research into practical interventions has been an asset to my development. I was introduced to the area of suicidology, which has become a research passion of mine. In addition, I was able to receive practicum training in neuropsychology and as a consultation-liaison in a medical trauma center.

My academic path is definitely not the norm, but I've been blessed to have experienced two different doctoral programs. They each have their strengths and weakness and I have been able to merge these experiences to add breadth to my abilities. This combination of program strengths was especially helpful when interviewing for internship positions, which is an extremely competitive process. I was fortunate to be matched with the Vanderbilt University/Veterans Affairs Consortium and am thrilled with my training experiences here. I have completed two rotations so far (Neuropsychology and recovery for veterans returning from Iraq and Afghanistan) and will complete a rotation in Polytrauma (PTSD along with at least one physical disability, usually a traumatic brain injury) and Hospice. I'm also receiving training with Vanderbilt University's Psychological Counseling Center providing LD/ADHD assessments for undergraduate and graduate students. This has helped to fill a gap in my previous training by gaining exposure to various cognitive and personality tests as well as the completion of integrated reports.

Happily, I am in the final stretch of obtaining my degree. I will defend my dissertation early next year and plan to graduate in August 2012. It definitely has been a long haul and although there are times when I curse the homework, the late nights and the missed social events, I know that ultimately it's worth it. I am much more confident in my skills and abilities. I also believe that my doctoral training has provided me with the knowledge needed to be an effective clinician.

My goals are to continue working within a VA setting focused on the area of trauma recovery with veterans returning from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. I'm energized by the evidenced-based treatments that exist and it has been fascinating to watch the excitement in their faces as they are able to live their lives without PTSD.

The Community Counseling program at IUP prepared me well for a degree in Counseling Psychology. There was a great deal of overlap between what I learned at IUP and what was taught during my first doctoral year. In addition, the live supervision model utilized by the Community Counseling program was integral to the development of my skills and confidence as a clinician. I highly encourage those of you who are considering continuing your education past your Master's degree to go for it! It is a commitment; however you will reap the rewards for the rest of your life.

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
