CCTS Held Fall Workshop - DSM-5

The IUP Center for Counselor Training and Services (CCTS) hosted Jack Klott, MSSW, LISW, CSW, for a one-day workshop entitled, "Uncovering the DSM-5®." The workshop was held on Tuesday, October 22, at the Greensburg Garden and Civic Center in Greensburg, PA, with 85 students and professionals in attendance.

During this workshop, participants gained an understanding of concepts that motivated the changes in the DSM-5®, including their impact upon certain diagnoses and the way in which diagnoses are made. Specific focus was given to those diagnostic categories and classification that received the most significant reformulations.

Participants seemed to enjoy Mr. Klott's presentation with one person relating, "Superb training! Outstanding lecturer and hugely relevant, timely topic. Jack Klott made the DSM-5® not just understandable, but a 'go to' source for understanding the processes of insight, reliability, and validity in diagnosing mental health illness."

ACES Conference in Denver, CO

This past October, I was given a great opportunity by Dr. Sibyl West to co-present with her at the <u>Associa-</u> <u>tion for Counselor Education and Supervision</u> (ACES) National Conference in Denver, Colorado. Dr. West and I had been working on a research project regarding evaluative feedback in the supervision process since the beginning of the semester, which was the topic that was accepted at the conference. Evaluative feedback refers to the constructive feedback that is offered to counseling students during the course of their education, especially during practicum and field supervision. Dr. West had been accepted to present on this topic at the conference earlier in the spring, and since I had become involved in the research, she wanted to include me in the presentation as well.

Our presentation was entitled, "A Counselor Education Program's Model for Gatekeeping Practices: Examining the Student Review Process." Our main focus was to provide a framework to the audience so that they could borrow practices or construct new ones to use in their own institutions. We provided the Indiana University of Pennsylvania's Counseling Department model, and also included some of the preliminary student perspectives found in our research. The presentation was well attended by several educators and professionals, and provoked an excellent discussion on the necessity of feedback in the supervision process. Attendees shared their own models of practice that they currently use, and also offered suggestions for future usage.

This was a phenomenal experience for me, not just because I got to travel to such a beautiful city, but also because I received excellent resources and made valuable connections. I attended other presentations on cutting edge concepts in the counseling field, and met counselors and counselor educators from all over the country. I cannot thank Dr. West enough for the chance to present at this conference, and I hope to attend many more conferences in the future!

CCTS conference on adolescence to feature an array of alumni speakers

Counseling alumni will be highlighted presenters at the Spring conference being organized by the <u>Center for Counselor</u> <u>Training and Services (CCTS)</u>. The one-day event on adolescent mental health will feature seminars by four Counseling graduates and will be held on **Friday, March 7**, at the Kovalchick Convention and Athletic Complex in Indiana. The conference theme is **"Adolescent Mental Health: Building Resilience for Early Adulthood."**

"It is shaping up to be a terrific event," said Dr. McCarthy, CCTS Director. "The plans have been coming along quite well, and I'm grateful for the range of speakers, particularly the Counseling alumni, who are participating in the conference." The four alumni presenters are John Frain, Corrin Linkes, Ryan Klingensmith, and Connie Kramer.

Mr. Frain, the Director of the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, will be one of the two keynote speakers in the morning of the event. The other keynote will be delivered by Dr. Mary Margaret Kerr, Chair and Professor of the Administrative Studies Department at the University of Pittsburgh.

Youth Mental Health and Social Network Trends for Professionals Working with Children and Teens (afternoon breakout session by Mr. Klingensmith)

PDE announces the change to a single PreK-12 certificate.

In November, PDE announced the change to a single certificate and mandates that all training programs be in compliance by June 30, 2014. As you may now, we moved our program to K-12 in 2011 and the new training standards rely heavily on the ASCA model and CACREP, so we are in good shape. While we have work to do to come into compliance with the new training competencies, the School Committee plans to have all the needed curriculum changes completed this spring.

Are you an alumni who currently holds one certificate, either Elementary or Secondary? If so, this change may be very good for you. It appears that PDE will allow us to approve you for the second certificate if you pass or have passed the Praxis II. This test is electronic, with paper testing available only as an accommodation with test dates, times, locations, and registration information available at <u>http://www.ets.org/praxis/pa/requirements</u> - Professional School Counselor CDT Code 5421 / PDT Code 0421. To date, it is not clear what the exact process is for applying for the new certificate. Our plan is to communicate and work with alumni as they navigate this process. As the process unfolds, we will post information BOTH on our website and on the department's Facebook page.

Our hope is to work with them to learn the details of the process and then use what we learn to provide trainings to help all our alumni who qualify apply for these funds!!!

To Qualify, Licensed Professional Counselors (LPCs) must:

- Have a master's degree or higher degree with a major study in counseling from a school accredited by a U.S. Department of Education nationally recognized regional or State institutional accrediting agency;
- 2. Have at least 2 years of post-graduate supervised counseling experience;
- Be certified as a National Certified Counselor (NCC) or a Certified Clinical Mental Health Counselor (CCMHC) by the National Board for Certified Counselors; AND
- 4. Have a current, full, permanent, unencumbered, unrestricted health professional license, certificate or registration (whichever is applicable) to practice independently and unsupervised as an LPC in the State in which they intend to practice under the NHSC LRP

2013 Distinguished Alumni Scholar—College of Education and Educational Technology

Jeff L. Samide, EdD, NCC, LPC is Associate Professor of Counselor Education at California University of Pennsylvania. He holds the additional credentials of Master Addictions Counselor (MAC) and Approved Clinical Supervisor (ACS) from the National Board of Certified Counselors. Dr. Samide earned his M.Ed. in Counseling with certification in Elementary School Counseling in 1977 and an Ed.D. in Counseling in 1990. Both of his graduate degrees were earned at IUP.

Dr. Samide's interest in counseling began during his college years at St. Vincent College when he worked part time as a mental health assistant in the inpatient unit of Latrobe Area Hospital. There he came to understand that a therapeutic relationship built on unconditional positive regard, empathy, genuineness and honesty were powerful curative forces in their own



right. Throughout his career, Dr. Samide sought to incorporate those building blocks into his practice of counseling, whether working with victims of sexual abuse and other crimes, or the perpetrators.

His experiences in career development have spanned thirty years. His interest was renewed as he assisted his daughter, Rosie, as she made decisions about her path in life. Dr. Samide is co-editor of the career development series, Research in Career Development. In 2011, he published his first co-edited book titled, <u>Career Development in Higher Education</u>. His second co-edited textbook on career development titled, Career Development across the Lifespan: Communities, Schools and Higher Education is scheduled for publication in the fall of 2013. He is particularly proud of the large number of writers who have contributed their expertise to the books, many of whom are former students and counselor educators in the PASSHE system, including IUP.

Dr. Samide has also published on a variety of other topics including spirituality and existential counseling, the fusion of art, science and technology into counselor education, clinical supervision and folklore. Throughout those writings, Dr. Samide has sought to better understand and integrate humanistic counseling and teaching theory into practice.

As a psychotherapist with over thirty-five years' experience, he has expertise in working with individuals and families suffering from a variety of problems including addiction, sexual abuse, domestic violence and more. He has pro-



vided testimony in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania courts well over two hundred times. Past positions include clinical director at a chemical dependency rehabilitation center, individual and group psychotherapist in a variety of settings, consultant, school counselor, and mental health emergency case worker specialist. In addition to teaching, Dr. Samide maintains a clinical consultation practice dealing with children, youth and family issues in Westmoreland County PA.


ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT—Tom Steiner, MA, NCC, LPC

To think that an illustrious 32-year counseling career started with a chance glance at a bulletin board in an unemployment office. Such was the experience of Tom Steiner, a 1983 alumnus of the Counseling program. Shortly after being laid off in his first position after completing college using the G. I. Bill, Mr. Steiner happened to see a 3"x5" index card that described a position as the Veterans and Admission Coordinator at Westmoreland County Community College (WCCC). Despite his lack of experience in higher education, he applied and got the position. "I was there for a week and realized that I needed a Master's degree," he explained. Based on his sister's graduation from the IUP Counseling program in 1974 and his colleagues' recommendation of the IUP program, he pursued his graduate degree for the next two years. "The classes were great," he remembered. "The faculty had so much experience. They were just the best."

After earning his Master's degree, Mr. Steiner subsequently moved to other positions at WCCC and eventually became a professor and career counselor from 1987 to his retirement in 2013. His passion for career counseling was sparked by a post-Master's IUP course taken at West Penn Hospital in Pittsburgh around 1991. The instructor, Dr. Gary Dean (IUP Adult and Continuing Education), is credited with boosting Mr. Steiner's interest in this area of counseling. "He is the one who got me hooked on career development," Mr. Steiner said. An NCC and an LPC, Mr. Steiner was also an active member of the Executive Board of the Pennsylvania College Personnel Association.

His advice to counseling students today echoed the theme of involvement. "Gather as much information as you can about the profession, particularly from practitioners," he recommended. "It's important for counseling students to see how big the field is."


