Dr. Utay earned his undergraduate degree in Education and Psychology from the University of Pittsburgh and his Master's and Doctoral degrees in Counseling from Eastern Texas State University (currently known as Texas A & M).

Dr. Utay work experience includes: classroom teaching, school counseling, school psychology, psychiatric casework supervision, private practice, and University teaching. Before coming to IUP, Dr. Utay was a tenured professor in the Dept. of Counseling at Eastern Kentucky University. He was Editor of the Kentucky Counseling Association's state professional journal and was re-elected twice as President of the Kentucky Mental Health Counselors Association. Dr. Utay relocated to Wexford, PA where he and his wife, Dr. Carol Utay, founded Total Learning Centers.

In addition to teaching part time at IUP, Dr. Utay works as a Licensed Professional Counselor and Licensed Marriage and Family Therapist as well as administers psychoeducational evaluations for Total Learning Centers. Currently, Dr. Utay is teaching Intro. to Community Counseling and Individual Practicum at the Monroeville campus.

Dr. Utay does a lot of community service writing. He co-authors regular monthly columns for *Northern Connections* and *North Hills Monthly Magazine* with his wife and colleague, Dr. Carol Utay. Dr. Utay also writes several articles a year for *Pittsburgh Parent* and *Pittsburgh Magazine*.

Alumni Spotlight: Dr. Joe Kloba

The Career Journey of IUP Counseling Graduate



Since my early days, as both an undergraduate and graduate student at IUP, I remember being "torn" between a variety of career options. First it was between teaching and psychology. After interning in both areas, I knew I wanted to help prevent

problems - not deal with them after the fact. So, school counseling seemed like a good option. After graduating with my B.S., I began teaching in Greensburg and entered the counseling program

After earning my M.Ed., and beginning my career as a school counselor, I was accepted for doctoral work at the University of Rochester. While at Rochester I had a profound experience that has impacted my life and career ever since. Raised in a church environment, I had what many may term a "born-again" experience. My professors encouraged me to research how my new-found faith in God could be integrated with psychology.

After completing my doctoral degree, principal and superintendent certifications, I served as a professor, and counseling department chairperson. However, I became increasingly frustrated that I was unable to overtly integrate my faith with psychology in the state university setting. It was then I was offered to become the founding administrator of a new program in Christian professional counseling at Regent University. Regent was one of the first such programs in the U.S. having a course and experiential work in Christian worldview integration.

Just when I was beginning to wonder where Christian professional counselors could be employed, I accepted a position as a corporate director of operations for a psychiatric health care organization placing Christian psychiatric units in secular hospitals throughout the U.S. Here, I learned how healing could be expedited and sustained by addressing spiritual issues in counseling.

Additionally, I served as the Vice President for the American Association of Christian Counselors (AACC). Over the years AACC has grown from 800 to 48,000 members, almost exceeding the member-ship of the American Counseling Association (ACA). Many ACA members joined AACC as they desired a forum to address the place of God in counseling.

In August 1995 I went to Palm Beach Atlantic Univ. to start a new Master's program, and serve as dept. head and professor. I also accepted the position of associate provost on the basis that I could retain my role as director and professor of counseling on a halftime basis. So now I am a professor, a counselor and an administrative leader in a place where I can overtly talk about God. I am not torn, but am richly blessed! Mrs. Ruth Spinelli Shares Her Story: A Tribute to the Late Dr. George Spinelli

As a current student, I have noticed the small paragraph in each Newsletter asking for donations toward the Dr. Spinelli Memorial Scholarship Fund. I'm aware that this scholarship is given annually to a current counseling student. What

I didn't know was the history of the person behind the scholarship; or, the story of his loving family who began this scholarship with a generous donation in order to keep his memory alive. However, by having a heartfelt conversation with Mrs. Ruth Spinelli (Dr. George Spinelli's widow), I learned the story of a great, hard working man; a story that each counseling student should know and work to keep alive.

During WWII George Spinelli was drafted into the service. Upon graduating as a 2nd Lieutenant, he was assigned to Courtland Army Air Base in Alabama where he attended Officer's Candidates School. There, he met his wife, Ruth, who was serving at the time as an Army Nurse. Previous to fulfilling her duties in Alabama, Ruth held the positions of volunteer American Red Cross Nurse and Operating Room Supervisor in Akron (Ohio) Children's Hospital.

After a year-long courtship, Ruth and George made plans to be married in June of 1944. These plans were altered when Ruth received a message summoning her to depart immediately for an overseas assignment. They discarded the planned June wedding, and were married the following day, March 29, 1944. As Ruth was overseas, George made his way through the ranks, and would eventually become a 1st Lieutenant at Courtland Army Air Base. "No matter where George went, he always got promoted," recalls Mrs. Spinelli. "He put his whole heart and soul into whatever he did."

In 1946, after suffering from, and eventually overcoming, a serious infection generated by a leg wound from the war, George was discharged from the service. His next goal was to go to college. He attended the University of Pittsburgh on the GI Bill. The Spinelli's began their family, and in 3 years they had three children - George, Greg, and Dolores also known as "Dotsy."

During this time, George was busily finishing his dual undergraduate degrees in Biological Sciences and Social Sciences. His continued education included an M.Ed. (1950), and D.Ed. (1962) in Guidance, Secondary Education, Administration and Supervision, and Educational Psychology.

During a time period spanning more than a decade, George Spinelli was not only climbing the ladder of his own educational knowledge, but he was also educating others.

Mrs. Ruth Spinelli (con't)

Dr. Spinelli began his career in education as a juniorsenior high school teacher. He then became a guidance counselor, and principal, in the Laurel Valley Joint School System, in New Florence, PA.

In the summer of 1959 Dr. Spinelli joined the faculty at IUP (then known as Indiana State Teacher's College). He taught undergraduate and graduate courses in counselor education and psychology. He was instrumental in paving the way for the formation of the Dept. of Counselor Education, serving as first Chairperson from 1966 until his retirement in 1983.

It is clear, that as a scholar and a leader, Dr. George Spinelli was quite exceptional. But it was his character qualities and his care for others that put him in the category of extraordinary. Mrs. Spinelli noted her husband's personal qualities through saying: "George gave people the strength and confidence to continue with their education. He helped people to believe in themselves. When he died, I received dozens of letters describing how George had made a difference in the paths people chose in their lives."

Mrs. Spinelli hopes that the scholarship keeps Dr. Spinelli's qualities of hard work, perseverance, compassion, and caring alive. I asked her what kind of person she would like to see the scholarship awarded to each year. Her answer was quick and to-the-point. "I hope the person is interested in the well-being of others." It's clear that Dr. Spinelli certainly was.

Wellness Course A Success for the Monroeville Program

Last spring, Dr. Robin Rishel taught a newly offered elective at the Monroeville campus entitled, Wellnessbased Counseling. With the collaboration of Dr. Jane Myers (University of North Carolina), Dr. Rishel developed this course and reports it was an exciting and rewarding challenge. In the course, students learned about theories surrounding personal change as well as assessing their personal levels of wellness and past attempts at change.

Assignments included taking а wellness assessment, scoring the instrument and designing a personal wellness profile and plan using a wellness workbook. Students worked in groups under the headings designated by the Wheel of Wellness, critiqued research articles and presented creative group projects on each of the following topics which are "spokes" of the Wellness Wheel: Spirituality, Work and Leisure. Self-Direction. Friendship and Love. There were also a number of guest speakers that were invited to share their expertise on such areas as Spirituality and Worksite Wellness programs.

The students seemed enthusiastic about the course. They gave Dr. Rishel much appreciated feedback on how to make the course even more beneficial. Dr. Rishel hopes to teach this class again in the near future.

Diagnostic and Treatment Issues: A New Elective Offered in Monroeville

A new elective, "Diagnostic and Treatment Issues for Counselors" was offered for the first time this summer and is being repeated during the Fall 2002 semester. Taught by Dr. McCarthy, this course examines the history of the DSM and looks at the criteria, characteristics, empirically supported counseling approaches, and prognoses for major mental disorders.

This three-credit class was held on five Saturdays during the summer, and this format received positive feedback from many participants. Dr. McCarthy commented on the class in saying: "What I particularly enjoyed about the class this summer was the diversity of students. There were about 15 in the class, many of whom were alumni of the program and brought great experience to the classroom." The course is currently being offered in Monroeville, and 20 students are registered.

She has a presentation with Dr. Guth at ACA World Conference in Anaheim, CA in March on the impact of WebCT on developing student's technical competencies. She is involved with Dr. Rishel on a project exploring the learning styles and attitudes of Counseling Graduate students.

Dr. McCarthy In addition to welcoming a new daughter into the world, Dr. McCarthy has been active in teaching and writing. His summer was filled with 3 classes, including a new course on "Diagnostic and Treatment Issues", taught on five consecutive Saturdays. (See related article.) Several alumni enrolled in the class. Dr. McCarthy stated that the course was a "wonderful way to connect with some people who have been involved with the Dept. for a much longer time than I." The course was enjoyable to teach, and the Saturday format was one that received positive feedback from most participants.

Dr. McCarthy notes that his writing has been a source of much pleasure. He recently had had an article on individualism and collectivism accepted by the Journal of Multicultural Counseling & Develop-ment. Dr. McCarthy also served as the primary author on a book chapter on motivational interviewing. The book is "Counseling employees: A multifaceted entitled approach" and was published this Fall by the American Counseling Association. Finally, Dr. McCarthy had a paper on traditional masculinity and counseling accepted by the Journal of Counseling & Development. It is co-authored by Ebony Holliday, a recent graduate and Dr. McCarthy's former graduate assistant. Ebony is now working on her doctoral degree at Lehigh University. Dr. McCarthy is also currently collaborating on an article with two students in the Monroeville program, Barb Weiner and Mary Ellen Jarrett.
