The Student Spotlight is a new feature of the PCA, designed to honor selected counseling students or recent counseling graduates of merit. The inaugural pair of students in the "Spotlight" was Mary Ellen Trenga (right) and Shellie Andolina, both Dec. 2003 graduates of Monroeville Community Counseling program.

Ms. Trenga is a Child/Adolescent Supervisor at the Mon Yough Community Services MHC. She oversees a team of case managers who work with over 350 children & adolescents with serious emotional challenges. She works with parents, families, school districts, family centers, and community facilities. In May 2003, Ms. Trenga was awarded the Spinelli Scholarship. Her experience in the cohort-based graduate model was a highlight of her Counseling program experience. "What I liked most of all was having this wonderful pool of creative professionals around me throughout all of my classes," she said. "The networking oppor-tunities alone were amazing, and the cohort was like nothing I had ever experienced."

Dr. Bob Witchel, her advisor said, "Mary Ellen brought years of experience to her academic journey. She was grounded experientially in the field and yet tackled new ideas and challenges with the excitement of a child on a new playground."

Ms. Andolina has served as a Clinical Specialist at Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic for six years where she provides services to individuals who are homeless and with a mental illness. In her work Shellie has the opportunity to "see people develop insight and make small steps toward knowing themselves." She offers a wide range of services from assessment to direct interventions, both group & individual, as well as case management. Shellie said the graduate process enhanced her knowledge base, and she appreciated the cohort model. "My peers became almost like a second family to me. 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

Counseling Students Success on NCE

A picture (or a chart) is worth a thousand words. As you will see below, the IUP students taking the NCE on October 18, 2003 had a mean score of 124.50. The IUP student "mean scores" were higher than the National [108.50], CACREP departments [113.82] and Non-CACREP Departments [110.82] mean scores. Of the eight students who took the exam, all eight passed! We are very proud of the accomplishment of these students.

Jennifer and Kristin also navigated a career website with the students to show them the value of career exploration and discovery. The program concluded with students asking career-oriented questions.

Teresa Mrozowski, guidance counselor at Westmont, applauded Jennifer and Kristin and stated that the program was a huge success and the talk of the school. Jennifer and Kristin have been invited to present again for next year's 8th grade students.

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On Thursday, April 29, 2004, the Admissions Office and Career Services hosted an IUP day for 155 6th graders, six teachers, and 12 chaperones from Hickory Grove Elementary School District. The

children learned about IUP, the admissions pro-cess, and career services. In addition, the Counseling Dept. offered a program called Careers and Caring, developed and presented by Erin-Caitlen Rinker, a secondary school counseling student and president of CESA. Erin's presentation



and activities centered around seven centers of care and their relationship to the world of work. The children participated in a career walk and explored a variety of careers through an activity that linked careers and caring. The children enjoyed the presentation and were eager to participate in the active-ties and the discussions that followed. Erin was Dr. Worzbyt's GA and has been working with him this year in finalizing a book entitled "Teaching Kids to Care and be careful." Ideas from this book were used in developing the workshop.

Faculty Updates

Dr. John McCarthy presented on "Depression in adolescence: The latest from the literature" in April at the ACA 2004 Annual Convention in Kansas City. MO. He also presented in Nov. with Courtney Griswold, his GA, on "Adolescent depression: Lessons from recent literature" at the Western Regional PA School Counselors Association Conference in Slippery Rock.
