Welcome to the Spring 2007 edition of the Department of Counseling Newsletter. This is the time of the year for endings and beginnings. Mitch Albom, the author of **The Five People You Meet in Heaven** says, "All endings are beginnings. We just don't know it at the time." For those students who graduated last week, they are ending their time with us and beginning or continuing their journey as counseling professionals. I always appreciate the connections that are recognized at graduation and the celebration of endings and beginnings. One poignant example is the birth of Sarah Genevieve Mirth, the daughter of Mike and Andrea Mirth, at 6:39 p.m. on May 11th at the point that Mike would have been receiving his M.Ed. degree as he is a member of the 1st Monroe-ville School Cohort. A few weeks earlier, we admitted about 50 new students into both the campus and Pittsburgh area programs; they are also engaged in a process of endings and beginnings. Additional students will be admitted to the Pittsburgh area programs over the summer.

I am ending my 26th year as an IUP faculty member and after this summer will be beginning my first Sabbatical. Two new faculty are ending their doctoral work and beginning their tenure at IUP in late August. Dr. Mary Graham from Oregon State University will be returning east after living in the Northwest for most of her life, and Kirsten Murray (planning to complete her dissertation in June) from Idaho State University will be moving out of Idaho for the first time in her life. See information on Mary and Kirsten on page three. For the first time, the Department will have twelve faculty.

Faculty have also been involved in ending and beginning various projects; read about their activities on pages two and three. We continue in the beginning stages of the planning of a doctoral program. The faculty have identified key issues that need to be addressed in order to proceed. The online survey has been completed by 228 students and alumni; we hope to have additional alumni complete the survey (see page 4). Thus far, 96 respondents expressed high interest in applying for the program, and there is a fairly equal interest in both the campus and Pittsburgh location for the program.

A number of students have been honored recently — Jennifer Sims, a member of Community Cohort 6, was named the Janet Fontaine Outstanding Student for 2006-2007. Sherry Shields, in the School Counseling campus program, is one of 15 recipients nationwide of the Ross Trust Scholarship awarded by the American Counseling Association. Lindsay Swiss, in the School Counseling campus program, is a recipient of the PSCA Scholarship. See more on pages 6 and 7.

The recent tragedy at Virginia Tech once again points to the significant role counseling professionals

Faculty Updates

Dr. Laura Marshak is looking forward to the summer after an especially busy year. Her activities, outside of the classroom, included the publication of a book she has been working on with Fran Prezant for more than four

years: Married with Special-Needs Children— A Couple's Guide to Staying Connected. The process of writing this book included interviewing many parents



of children with severe disabilities about the issues they experience within their marriages and ways in which they cope with them. As a result of the book's publications, she has been involved with many related activities including interviews for radio and print and speaking at support groups. One presentation was on the development of supervision contracts and the other was on the topic of addressing spiritual issues in teaching and supervision. Also in Oct., I presented with GA's Sherry Shields and Jennifer Alker at the PA Counseling Association meeting in State College on developing student remediation plans. Sherry and len did a great job! I also continue to serve the faculty union as grievance chairperson, and was recently elected to serve as chair of the college's Graduate Council.

The CACREP accreditation process continues to hum along. As we near final draft stage, faculty have given the self study a final review. We anticipate that the self study will be submitted to CACREP very soon. Once we've been given the approval for a site visit, we will be contacting students, employees, and site supervisors to participate in interviews at both the Indiana and Penn Center East campuses. My girls are six and four already! I plan to spend much of the summer enjoying them. We're trying to make part of our backyard a natural habitat for native flora and fauna. Center for Counselor Training and Services Events for 2007-2008

Plans for its 2007-2008 workshops are well underway, as CCTS is bringing two nationally known speakers, Dr. Fred Hanna and Dr. David Capuzzi, for training activities. Dr. Fred Hanna (pictured at right) will be presenting a one-day workshop entitled "70 Strategies for Counseling Difficult Defiant Adolescents." Dr. Hanna is Director of the School of Applied Psychology and Counselor Education at the University of Northern Colorado. Formerly, he served as Professor of Counseling at Johns Hopkins University for 11 years and remains a Faculty Associate there. This event will take place at the CCAC Boyce Campus Auditorium (Monroeville) October 26, 2007. Participants will learn to produce "initial breakthrough" with difficult, defiant adolescents and how to motivate difficult adolescents to engage in counseling and make positive life changes. He is the author of the book *Therapy with Difficult Clients: Using the Precursors Model to Awaken Change* (2001)



And, mark your calendars for 2008! Dr. David Capuzzi, past president of the American Counseling Association, will be presenting two one-day workshops on April 29 and April 30, 2008. On April 29, Dr. Capuzzi will be delivering a workshop entitled, "Youth Suicide: Prevention and Crisis Management." This event will take place at the Eberly Auditorium at the IUP main campus. He will also be presenting a workshop entitled, "The Many Facets of Grief" on April 30, 2008 at the CCAC-Boyce Campus. Information concerning registration for 2007-2008 workshops will be available in August.

Graduate Student Administration of the NCE (GSA-NCE)

The GSA-NCE will be administered at the IUP Main Campus on October 20, 2007. Students who participate in the Board Eligible GSA-NCE have the advantage of taking the NCE at a reduced rate. In order to register for this exam, you must be a currently enrolled student or a May 2007 graduate. Applications packets will soon be available in 206 Stouffer Hall. The completed application, forms, and fee must be submitted to 206 Stouffer Hall by 5:00 p.m. on June 14, 2007. (Do not send your forms to NBCC). Important Change: Students who graduate more than six months prior to the exam date are not eligible to sit for this exam until the required two years of post-graduate experience needed for the NCC credential is completed. Therefore, if you do not want to wait two years after graduation to take the exam, you should register for the GSA-NCE administration while you are eligible.

Summer 2007 Indiana and Monroeville

Counseling Issues in Adolescence (COUN 681) **Indiana**, Tues. 4:30-10:30pm (July 9 –Aug 9). In this class, contemporary adolescence along with therapeutic approaches—both individual and group—with teen will be covered. Specific topics will include depression, suicide, eating disorders, and promoting positive mental health. This course is open to students in either the school or community track. **John McCarthy**

Counseling the Bereaved (COUN 681) **Monroeville,** Thurs. 4:45-7:15pm (June 4 –Aug 9). This course is designed as an indepth study of the grief process and techniques for helping those who are experiencing bereavement. All aspects of grief will be explored, including the various theories of grief and mourning. Differentiation is made between normal and complicated bereavement. Grief in special losses, such as suicide, still birth, murder, etc is also examined. **TBA**

Fall 2007 Indiana and Monroeville

Addictions & Addictions Counseling (COUN 674) Monroeville, Tues. 7:20-9:50pm. This course provides an opportunity to develop an understanding of the addictive process and its relation to counseling clients with a variety of chemical and behavioral addictions. This course examines theories, techniques, and practices of addictive behavior and addictions counseling. **TBA**

Introduction to Diagnostic Issues (COUN 671) **Monroeville**, Tues. 4:45-7:15pm and **Indiana**, Mon. 8:00-10:30pm. This course provides an overview of the various mental disorders with a focus on the history of the major classification system definitions of various disorders, their criteria, and counseling approaches. **John McCarthy**.
