Also, we have a "new" addition to the Dept., the Digital Counselor Training Facility (DCTF). We are very excited about the DCTF and will introduce you to this new resource on pages 2 & 3 of this Newsletter. The initial phase of the DCTF was supported by a \$78,000 grant developed by Drs. We are proud to share that the IUP Counseling Department was recently named the "Outstanding Counselor Education Preparation Program" by the Pennsylvania Counseling Association (PCA) at its 35th Annual Conference in State College on Oct. 25, 2003. Each year, PCA invites nominations from Counseling Departments and makes an award to the outstanding professional counseling program in the State of Pennsylvania.

Dr. John McCarthy, assistant professor of counseling, accepted the award on behalf of the department. The department submitted a packet of materials for judging, which included a rationale for the nomination, departmental goals, information from an advisory board meeting, a departmental alumni newsletter, 2002-2003 faculty publications and presentations, a press release regarding a student statewide award, a list of new electives, an impressive list of faculty scholarly activities, and continuing education workshop brochures. Dr. Dandeneau and all of the faculty are very pleased to receive this award which indicates acknowledgement by the PCA of our hard work to develop an outstanding counselor preparation program.

Counselor Training Facility for the 21st
Century, Dr. Bob Witchel

As many of you recall our on-campus department training facility consists of five rooms equipped with VHS camcorders, outdated audio equipment, and no remote observation capabilities. This technology was developed in the 1970's, and while it was once an effective system, it is rapidly becoming obsolete. New technology currently exists to digitize and totally revamp our counselor training facility, with the goal to move the training of counselors into the 21st century. With the development of the facility described below, we will have a state-of-the-art, prototypical counselor training facility.

This digitized system fosters a level of video analysis that is easy to use, facilitates skill development, and enhances individual/group instruction and supervision. There are four main components of the digital training facility:

The Counseling Lab is the hub of the facility and has several functions: 1.) It has a video/audio routing system that allows users (students and faculty) to select where sessions will be viewed and recorded; 2.) It has a camera control unit that allows users to remotely and unobtrusively manipulate the



pan-tilt-zoom functions of the cameras housed in the interview rooms; 3.) It has wireless receivers & headphones that allow users to access the audio of any sessions occurring and allows live-supervision, via an in ear-feedback (IFB).

This IFB allows faculty and students to provide realtime instruction/feedback while counseling training sessions are being conducting – this is a high-tech "bug-in-the-ear" system; and 4.) It has the capacity to digitally record counseling sessions on the Landros (see the section on the Landro Learning Stations) and on VHS/DVD equipment.

Three Landro Learning Stations are also

housed in the Counseling Lab. The digitized counseling sessions that are recorded to the Landro units can then be analyzed and coded using a prescribed database. The database is developed by faculty and geared to the learning



objectives for the specific course. Students are then able to mark and code each response. These marking, called clip marks, once coded can be retrieved and searched by the code. Thus, a student or a faculty member could search all of these sessions for the most

most effective restatements or for all the advanced empathic statements. Each Landro Learning Station is equipped with a Landro, a monitor, and a headset.

Three clinical rooms will be newly outfitted. Each room will be equipped with two remote controlled pan-tilt-zoom cameras for remote

recording and observation for instruction and supervision. There will also be new microphones in each room to transmit the audio to the monitoring and recording devices. Each room will additionally have IFB capabilities.



A designated classroom that currently has a computer and video projector will be equipped so that faculty will have complete control of the total video/audio system from this remote location and as such could observe selected sessions as they are occurring. They also will be able to play any session that has been archived by the Landro and/or the VHS/DVD recorders. In addition, faculty will be able to provide IFB from this classroom.

Students are the greatest benefactors of this innovative technology. Here are a few examples of how they will benefit.

- They can do a frame-by-frame analysis of their counseling skills;
- They'll have the ability to create both an analog and a digital record of counseling skill performance;
- They will be able to create digitized clips of demonstrated specific counseling skills for enhanced faculty-student supervision;
- It will decrease students' focus on non-learning time-intensive tasks such as session transcription; and
- They can receive remote instruction for live supervision both individually and during class time.

As practicing counselors, you are aware of how important it is for students to acquire the necessary skills to effectively interact with clients. Phase 1 of the project will result in the installation of digitized supervision equipment and video-editing software as described above. However, our dream is also to implement Phases 2-5 of this significant project, which includes acquiring additional equipment, training all of the faculty, infusing the technology into the remaining clinical courses, and expanding the use of this technology for the clinical instruction in the Community Counseling program offered at the Monroeville Professional Center.

Digital Counselor Training Facility Some Background and History

We'd like for you to have some background ... At the initial meeting of the Department Advisory Board, the alumni challenged the department to "think outside the box." They encouraged us to not simply maintain the status quo, but to evolve in ways that would be innovative and bring recognition to the department. And so it began ... While counselor education programs have moved forward with respect to the training of counselors to use technology with respect to their various job roles and functions, programs and counselor educators have not moved forward in the utilization of digitized technology for the purposes of the clinical training of these very counselors.

In Fall 2000, Dr. Dandeneau chaired an ad hoc committee of the College Technology Committee whose purpose was to address and plan for the emerging technical needs as they relate to those departments whose primary function is clinical training. This committee was clear about the need for new and improved technology, but we weren't sure that the technology or the products we needed A College of Education and even existed. Educational Technology computer technician, Kevin Painter, began an exhaustive Internet search for the needed technology. His search was very productive. In fact, the technology and products DID exist AND the company, IRIS Technology, Inc, that produced the technology and products was located in Greensburg, PA AND the President and CEO of the company, Jerry Salandro is an IUP alumnus who completed his master's degree in communications within the College of Education and Educational Technology. His company, IRIS Technologies, Inc., is a privately held company that develops and supports PC-based control hardware and Windowsbased software for the communica-tions industry. Mr. Salandro, who founded the company in 1987, holds over 20 patent claims for software concepts developed for the company. It was after his graduation from IUP that he fell in love with and found success with media technologies.

Jerry's technology successes began in 1979 when he founded the first one-hour-photo system in the United States. In the early 1980's he patented a popular product that allowed for photos and home movies to be transferred to videocassettes. Out of these successes came IRIS technologies Inc., which was named because of the functions of the Iris in the human eye. IRIS Technologies, Inc. has become world renown for its video commander, the leading product of IRIS Technologies, Inc. The video commander connects devices such as, but not

limited to VCRs, DVDs, cameras, and CD players. Through the use of PC-based hardware and windows software, the video commander allows people to simply and efficiently communicate with one another. IRIS Technologies produces the Videotizer and the Landro that are being incorporated into the training facility. The videotizer works as a VCR, but without the hassles of tapes. The Landro, a product of Jerry's love for sports, allows coaches to record, review, and critique plays from not only their own teams, but of the competition as well. The videotizer in the form of a modified Landro is the basis of the Landro Learning Stations in the facility.

Dr. Dandeneau states "I can't believe that we could find a company that could help us with this project and I absolutely never dreamt that we would find them in our own backyard and that Mr. Salandro is also an IUP alumnus. It is amazing how all of this seems to have come together. The collaborative working relationship that we have developed with IRIS is incredible." In short, the DCTF would not be feasible without the innovative, state-of-the-art, easy-to-use products of IRIS. With their assistance, our updated digital clinical training facility could easily become an innovative, prototypical model for counselor education programs, nationally and internationally.

Dr. Bob Witchel was recognized by the College, and Dean John Butzow, for his extensive efforts to develop the community counseling program in the Pittsburgh area. In fact, Dr. Witchel was the prime initiator of our Monroeville program. The work that he did to facilitate the development of this alternative



delivery substantial and laborious. The success of this has been program Since its incredible. inception in January 2000. we have admitted five cohort

groups of 25-28 students adding approximately 125 students to the department's total enrollment. The program now operates three cohorts at one time at varying stages of program completion and admits a new cohort every Fall semester. We have already graduated two cohorts and are now in the midst of recruiting for the 6th cohort for Fall 2004 – the most recent Open Houses drew 35+ potential students. It is noteworthy to mention that since we started the program in Monroeville, Dr. Witchel has successfully worked with 3 different Continuing Education Director's of off-campus programs. Due to his efforts the sustainability of the program was self-evident and the department was able to move the program from "experimental" to permanent status and hired 2.5 new faculty through Continuing Education to support the program.

We are all proud of Dr. Witchel's accomplishments and thank him for dedication to our department and, especially the Monroeville Community Counseling program.

Spring 2004 Workshop

The IUP Counseling Department is sponsoring internationally renowned Robert Brooks as its Spring Workshop presenter on April 27, 2004, 8:30 am –

4:00 pm, in the Eberly Hall auditorium on the IUP campus. Dr. Brooks is on the Harvard Medical School faculty and served as Director of Psychology at Boston's McLean Hospital, a private psychiatric hospital. He will be speaking on "Working with Angry, Resistant Youth: Strategies for Fostering Motivation, Self-Discipline, and Resilience."

Dr. Brooks has lectured nationally and internationally to audiences of parents, educators, mental health professionals, and business people on topics pertaining to motivation, resilience, self-esteem, family relationships, the qualities of effective leaders, and balancing our personal and professional lives.

Dr. Brooks has a part-time private practice in which he sees children, adolescents, adults, and families and has appeared regularly on television shows in the Boston area and on national cable television. He completed a videotape and education-al guide for PBS titled "Look What You've Done! Stories of Hope and Resilience" focusing on selfesteem and resilience in children with special needs. He also participated in the production of two videotapes (Sunburst Communications) on the parenting of children with learning and attentional problems and on developing responsibility in children.

He has written two books, "So That's How I Was Born!" (Simon & Schuster) and "The Self-Esteem Teacher" (Treehaus Communications). He has coauthored "A Pediatric Approach to Learning Disorders" (Wiley): "Raising Resilient Children" (Contemporary Books/McGraw-Hill); "Nurturing Resilience in Our Children: Answers to the Most Important Parenting Questions" (Contemporary Press/McGraw-Hill); and "Seven Steps to Help Your Child Worry Less" (Specialty Press). He and Dr. Sam Goldstein prepared a parenting video and curriculum about resilience (Brookes Publishing). They have also completed a documentary "Tough Times/Resilient Kids" that was a finalist in the 23rd Annual Telly Awards. His newest book, written with Dr. Kristy Hagar, is entitled "The Power of Resilience" and has just been released.

Dr. Brooks received a Gubernatorial Award for Distinguished Public Service for his work with the Governor's Alliance Against Drugs in Massachusetts. In addition, Dr. Brooks has served as a consultant to "Sesame Street Parents Magazine."

Wellness & Gestalt Therapy Electives Spring 2004 in Monroeville

This spring, Dr. Rishel will be teaching "Wellness-based Counseling (COUN 681; 502) on Thursdays (7:20 – 9:50 PM) in Monroeville. This class explores wellness-based counseling theories that help indivi-

duals develop a greater capacity to live more productive and satisfying lives. In wellness counseling, client and counselor work together to build on existing strengths and find solutions to problems, step-by-step. Counselors' unique professional identity in the helping professions will also be explored.

Dr. Witchel will be teaching an elective in Gestalt therapy (COUN 681, 503). Gestalt therapy is a dynamic approach to self-discovery and personal development, with a primary focus on "awareness" of present experience, and "self-responsibility." We will cover theoretical origins and development of Gestalt Therapy, present and practice therapeutic strategies, and explore a wide range of applications of Gestalt including, working with individuals, groups, children, couples, families, and persons having substance abuse or mental health diagnoses.
