

Welcome to this edition of the Dept. of Counseling Newsletter. Another busy academic year has come to a close; they fly by so fast. This is the 10th edition of the Newsletter, which has become an important way for us to com-municate with over 1200 alumni.

The department's most significant growth comes in the approval to add two full-time temporary faculty to our ranks for the upcoming year, as a result of the success of the Monroeville/Pittsburgh Community Counseling program. We anticipate admitting 25 new students to this program in the fall, bringing our total enrollment in Pittsburgh to over 60 students. We are hopeful that these two positions will soon become tenure-track. On-campus applications have been higher than ever, allowing us to be quite selective in our recent admission's screening process.

IUP Faculty & Alumni receive PSCA Awards

Dr. John Worzbyt was selected to receive the award for **Counselor Educator of the Year for 2001**. Nominees for this award are judged using the following criteria: professional leadership, original and effective approach to the delivery of counseling services, competence as a counselor, and evidence of continuing interest in professional growth.

Dr. Worzbyt felt honored to be recognized for this award and his nomination packet will be submitted

to the American School Counselor Association for consideration for the national award. Dr. Worzbyt was also the recipient of the 1997 Eminent Practitioner Award from the PA Counseling Association.

Dr. Dandeneau has had an atypical semester. Due the increase in course offerings and the addition of temporary faculty, she increased her administrative workload and decreased teaching activities. And, as luck would have it, the department had decided to offer it's first-ever spring semester daytime course and it was her course that was chosen to pilot the early time slot.

In her role as chair, Dr. Dandeneau has been advocating the need for improved and advanced clinical training technology in the departmental A multidisciplinary team of counseling rooms. faculty members from other clinical training departments, wrote a collaborative grant that was submitted to the Office of Educational Technology Dept. of Ed. under their Link-to-Learn Initiative. The proposed upgrade would add many new features to training and supervision of our students. For example, faculty could observe counseling sessions on the computers in their offices, route sessions to a classroom for observation, create a supervision tape by dubbing over their comments on a taped session, and students could digitally edit their sessions to focus on specific learning goals.

Professionally, Dr. Dandeneau has continued her work with SCI-Pine Grove. Her evaluation team has prepared a survey instrument and will soon begin data collection. She has also been an active member of an advisory committee that is working on developing a national correctional education center here at IUP. The group is hoping to receive both state and federal funding to support this important initiative. Dr. Dandeneau worked with two students making presentations at PSCA: Candace Rawley and Jennifer Lynch (see page 4). Dr. Dandeneau and Jennifer Lynch are submitting the presentation for publication in a teacher education journal, Childhood Education. Lastly. Dr. Dandeneau was asked to serve on the search committee for the Director of Off-Campus Studies.

Dr. Fontaine encourages graduates to consider submitting articles to **The Professional School Counselor** journal. Since she has been on the Journal's editorial board, she has found that many student papers completed for classes are of the quality of articles submitted to the Journal. If you believe you've got an idea of interest to other school counselors, contact her to discuss the prospects of publishing in the Journal.

Dr. Fontaine just returned from Washington, D.C. where she attended a meeting of the Healthy Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual Adolescents Project at APA. National survey results of school nurses, school psychologists and social workers and school counselors provided valuable insights into what type of training school professionals need to better prepare them to work with the LGB population in their schools. Within a week, she was off to San Antonio to present at the American Counselors Association National Conference. It's a busy spring for her! In June, she'll attend the American School Counselor's Association conference in Portland for an Editorial Board meeting as well as the yearly meeting of ASCA National Standards Train the Trainers Program.

Dr. Guth is enjoying watching her son Alex grow and explore. He recently turned two and went iceskating for the first time! Dr. Guth recently represented the Department at the Hot Topics for Counselor Education meeting at Kutztown University. She was recently awarded a technology mini-grant for integrating technology into her community counseling class.

Dr. Guth is the Association for Specialists in Group Work (ASGW) Awards Committee Co-Chair and helped present the awards at the ASGW luncheon held during the ACA Conference in San Antonio. She is also the Co-Chair for the ASGW Board Approved Workshop Presenter Committee. She also served as the Division 49 (Group Psychology and Group Psychotherapy) Program Co-Chair for the 2001 American Psychological Assoc. Conference to be held in San Francisco.

Dr. Guth was recently awarded a Proposal Development Incentive Plan grant to write a grant entitled "Student Attitudes Towards Homosexuality: The Effects of Internet Training." Drs. Guth and Witchel are beginning to analyze the data they have collected for their grant-funded study examining the self-concept, gender identity, and sexuality of individuals with Congenital Adrenal Hyperplasia. Dr. Guth was also recently appointed to the editorial board for the New Jersey Journal of Professional Counseling.

Students were surveyed at the end of the experience so that she could learn more about the experience from the students' perspective and to make any instructional/ design improvements for future use. She also applied for and received a technology mini-grant from the college, allowing her to enhance her ability to design appealing lessons. Her plan is to eventually design some distance education courses that could benefit alumni and counseling professionals who need continuing education credits for certification and licensure. 

Alumni Spotlight: Mike Reed

I'm very fortunate to have landed a position that fits me. I am the only guidance counselor at Upper Dauphin Area Middle School (grades 5-8), which services about 420 students. I manage a developmental guidance program & have recently wrote and introduced a school-wide Character Education Curriculum that is going over very well.

With assistance from my principal, I wrote a grade 5-8 "Integrity/Character" curriculum. Each month every teacher in the middle school meets with 12-15 students for 50 minutes, to go over a lesson that focuses on one of our monthly integrity themes (themes listed below). The lesson plans are very specific and scripted. However, if a teacher wants to break away from the lesson and add other input, or if he/she wants to do other activities that falls under the monthly theme, they have the freedom to do so. Each teacher will keep the same group of students year after year until they leave the middle school. Once their group graduates to the high school, they will re-start with a group of 5th graders.

Students are randomly grouped by grade. This is only the 2nd year of the program. However, it has been going extremely well. I plan on rewriting/revising the curriculum again this summer for the third time, after collecting and reviewing continual teacher feedback.

Most of the information I used for the curriculum was from the net, magazines, administrative courses, guidance interns, and odds and ends that I've collected. I think the program has been successful thus far because it is practical and rewarding for students.

Monthly themes:

September: Group introductions/ice breakers

October: Respect
November: Responsibility

December: Self confidence/goal setting

January: Attitude February: Acceptance

March: Career and Teamwork

April: Kindness

May: Ethics and Honesty

Alumni Spotlight: Francine Endler Elementary Character Education

Character Education programs are designed to reinforce or develop qualities in students, which help make them successful individuals. Character traits such as Respect, Responsibility, Honesty, Citizenship, and Caring are often highlighted in Character Education programs. There are many ways to incorporate character education into the curriculum. Often times, these programs are

done in conjunction with other developmental guidance activities.

Character Education programs are being implemented in schools all across the United States. The size and scope of the programs vary tremendously and children are seeing the benefits of displaying strong character traits. I was fortunate to be given the opportunity to implement a pilot program for Character Education in the elementary school in which I am employed. Here are a few tips for you if your school is considering introducing Character Education into the curriculum:

- Harness as much talent and energy as you can from your teachers and support staff. Programs such as these are not one-person jobs.
- Involve parents in the planning and implementation process. Their input is valuable & shows others that the program has parental support.
- 3. Community members are tremendously helpful in reinforcing character traits with children.
- Don't reinvent the wheel! There are plenty of existing resources and low-cost ideas that you can readily access.
- 5. Most importantly, HAVE FUN!
