Dr. Marshak was engaged in a number of projects related to disability throughout this past academic year. The School Counselor's Guide to Helping Students with Disabilities was published in December and was coauthored with Drs. Dandeneau, Dr. L'Amoreaux, and Fran Prezant. They were pleased that the appendices were authored by many of our students. Most recently, she co-authored a children's book which portrays an award-winning scientist, who has been blind since childhood, and the mollusks he studies. Her G.A., Danielle Wolfe, did a beautiful job with the graphics and layout. Along with Lindsay Swiss (a former G.A.) and Dr. Todd VanWieren of Disability Support Services at IUP, Dr. Marshak published a qualitative research study that examined reasons why college students with disabilities choose not to use accommodations.

It was also a busy year in terms of presentations. Her favorite was conducting a weekend marriage workshop for 55 couples who have children with Down syndrome. She also spoke at the International Family Therapy Association in Buenos Aires, the National Autism Association, and the Council for Exceptional Children, and parent support groups and conferences. In addition, she spent a lot of time in her role as the professional advisor of the Friendship Circle, an inclusion group that brings together typical and atypical children.

Faculty Updates Cont'd...

Dr. McCarthy writes, I had the "honor" of being accepted into a program where consultants from various Western countries help universities in countries that were former Soviet republics. The purpose of the program is to assist departments and to aid faculty who had returned with graduate degrees from Western Europe and the US. I was assigned to the Psychology Department at Yerevan State University (YSU) in Armenia. I knew little about the country. I recalled watching television one afternoon in the late 80's, and the program was interrupted for a special news report about a devastating earthquake there. That was all that I could recall about this small, land-locked nation that is approximately the size of Maryland.

My two trips to Yerevan revealed a bustling city with welcoming people. During my first lecture, students stood upon my entry into the classroom! The room was sparse by our standards: a small desk at the front, a tiny blackboard. No computer, no Internet, and no screen. The students, were quite impressive in their attentiveness and the depth of their comments and ideas. They asked thoughtful questions, reflective of fine preparation.

Counseling as a profession does not exist in Armenia. There is no licensure, certification, code of ethics, or accreditation. Yet the University recently started a training clinic, and "counselors" (more likely called psychologists) are present in the schools and in the community. When speaking to a Theories class, I asked which approach they thought was best. I named various theories and asked them to raise their hands when I said their theory of choice. A few indicated that they were most in agreement with CBT, person-centered, or Gestalt, but the majority of students had not raised their hands. I wondered aloud, "What theory have I missed?" One student who understood English raised his hand and said, "Life's problems." He was speaking of existentialism, so I asked the rest of the class how many agreed with the "life problem" approach, and about 75 percent raised their hands.

I was most impressed with the experiences people shared. Having grown up during the Soviet rule, most adults spoke Russian in addition to their native Armenian. One eight-year-old boy I met spoke Armenian, Russian, and

English and was in the process of studying Spanish! The experience left me with a greater understanding and appreciation of the geopolitical situation in Eastern Europe. I now grasp the ramifications of having a closed border with a neighboring country. In this case, Armenia and Turkey did not have diplomatic relations. It would be as if the US and Canada had closed borders. Imagine, traveling to Canada, but having to fly to a third country (Greenland??) first, as no direct flights would be permitted.

Finally, in addition to having made new Armenian friends, I had the good fortune of developing several more colleagues in Eastern Europe and Central Asia through other meetings related to the program. Again I was struck by their resilience and dedication to teaching. I talked with one professor at Georgia State University (in Tbilsi...not the one in Atlanta) who recently started to use Moodle. I met other professors who had to translate books from English into the local language because of the lack of availability of texts and the inability of students to purchase books. These colleagues from Armenia, Serbia, Georgia, Moldova, Mongolia, Kyrgzstan, and other nations have inspired me in ways difficult to explain. Nonetheless I hope to bring that inspiration into the IUP classroom...not only through my teaching and sharing of their stories, but, if the technology can permit, through direct interviews on Skype. All in all, it has been a rich, fruitful international experience that has touched me professionally and personally.

Dr. Cato co-chaired an ACA conference event at Pittsburgh Milliones University Prep Middle School for the Association of Multicultural Counseling and Development Service Day. She co-authored a chapter on the foundation of the ASCA National Model in 'A Guide to Practicum and Internship for School Counselor Trainees' edited by Studer & Diambra, which was published in March. Dr. Cato also presented at the Ohio Association of Counselor Education and Supervision conference in Dublin, Ohio on minority student recruitment and retention in counselor education programs. Finally, Dr. Cato has been training since lanuary to run her first 5k ever and in April, ran the Genesis Riverside Run for Adoption. In May, she also ran the 5k organized by the Pittsburgh's chapter of Girls on the Run International.

Dr. Wubbolding Group Work in Reality Therapy

Dr. Bob Wubbolding, one of the more renowned figures in the Counseling profession, offered a one-day workshop on "Group Work in Reality Therapy" through the CCTS in May. Wubbolding, one of the premier authors and practitioners in Reality Therapy, is Professor Emeritus of Counseling at Xavier University and an internationally known teacher, author and practitioner of Reality Therapy. His contributions to the theory and practice include the ideas of "Positive Symptoms," "The Cycle of Counseling," and the "Five Levels of Commitment." He has written extensively on Reality Therapy, including *Reality Therapy for the 21st Century*.

Since January 2002, over 1200 area students, professionals, and faculty members have attended CCTS trainings.

School Counselor Professional Development Day 2010

Indiana area school counselors participated in a one-day CCTS workshop as part of the IUP's seventh annual "School Counselor Professional Development Day" in January. The event was held at IUP and was financially supported by Dr. Mary Ann Rafoth, Dean of the College of Education and Educational Technology. The keynote speaker was Dr. Lee, who serves as the Director of Counselor Advocacy at the National Office for School Counselor Advocacy (NOSCA) of The College Board in Washington, DC. In the past four years, over 350 school counseling professionals had attended the yearly event.

Using a specific model of wellness in combination with the model of change, students will explore human change and wellness from personal and interpersonal perspectives. The following was received from NBCC related to those who graduated from our programs since July 2007: The applications of your students and alumni who applied and tested for the NCC in the 12 months prior to CACREP's decision to accredit the community counseling and school counseling tracks at IUP have been "converted" by our staff from their initial Board Eligible category to the GSA-NCC CACREP category. As such, those applicants are not required to document any post-graduate experience or supervision hours. That requirement of the NCC credential is waived for graduates of CACREP-accredited tracks. As soon as these applicants submit an official, final (sealed) transcript and their Counseling Supervisor's Endorsement form, they can be certified.
