Program Description:

The program in psychology leads to a Bachelor of Arts degree and is designed to give students an understanding of the methods of psychological inquiry and the state of knowledge in the science of behavior and mental processes. The major offers the background required for graduate work in psychology and also preparation for such related fields as social work, business, medicine, marketing, law, criminal justice, and education. Psychology majors select one of two specializations (Applied Psychology and Psychological Science) which allows them to tailor their educational experience to their own goals and interests. The program emphasizes a broad scholarly foundation across the chief areas of psychology, depth of learning in students' chosen direction, and hands-on opportunities for skill-building integrated throughout the program.

Student Organizations:

Psi Chi is an international honors society for psychology students, and our local chapter functions as a sort of "psychology club." All students are welcome to attend the meetings of Psi Chi, whether they are official members or not. Meetings involve professional development activities; panel discussions about graduate school and career opportunities; and service-learning opportunities. Qualified students are encouraged to apply for official membership in the international honors society!

Experiential Learning:

Skill-building opportunities are integrated throughout our courses in psychology. We also maintain an active practicum program through which students earn course credit for working in field settings. For example, we have placed students at Alice Paul House (victim advocacy), The Open Door (substance abuse treatment), Community Guidance Center (mental and behavioral healthcare provider), Head Start (early childhood education), the Behavioral Health Unit at Indiana Regional Medical Center (our local hospital), and more. We are always open to developing new practicum sites for interested students! In addition, students have opportunities to assist faculty members with research as a volunteer or for course credit.
