Leslie Grahn has twenty-seven years of language teaching experience at the middle and high school levels and twelve years of experience at the central office level, most recently as Coordinator of World Languages for the Howard County Public School System in Maryland. Leslie has led both curriculum and assessment development teams and is a frequent presenter at state, regional, and national conferences, specializing in best practices.
