Wallace DePue, Jr. received his Doctorate of Musical Arts in violin performance from the University of Texas in 2006. He has served as assistant principal violinist of the Austin Lyric Opera Company from 2000-2006 and is presently assistant concertmaster of the Philly Pops. Wallace has served as co-concertmaster of the John Williams' "Stars Wars" Orchestra for two national tours in 2009 and 2010. He also is an active recording artist with NFL Films. As the band's lead vocalist, Wallace can sing it all from rock to bluegrass to—yes—yodeling.

Jason DePue is currently a member of the first violin section of the Philadelphia Orchestra, recently completing his eleventh season. Formerly concertmaster of the New York String Seminar and the Curtis Symphony Orchestra, Jason has attended both the Curtis Institute and Encore for Strings. In furthering the art of violin playing, he has performed two milestone concerts: one evening of the entire sonatas and partitas of I.S. Bach and a concert of the entire twenty-four Pagannini caprices. As an active teacher in his created Guarneri String Quartet Studio Room, Jason enjoys keeping the flame burning for the next generation of great violin playing.

Mark Cosgrove, guitarist and vocalist, has a distinctive, creative flat-picking guitar sound. He is also known and respected on both sides of the Atlantic for his work as a session player and sideman for Jerry Douglas and others. He has won the U.S. National Flat-picking Guitar Championship in Winfield, Kansas, and also the Doc Watson Guitar Championship in Wilkesboro. North Carolina. Along with his regular work with the DePue Brothers Band and as a solo artist, Mark is a regular member of the David Bromberg Band, tours often with Italian guitarist Roberto Dalla Vechia, and performs with his own band, Good Medicine. He is also sought after as teacher in a number of guitar camps around the country and abroad. Mark has five CD releases on the FGM label including his latest solo release. Unencumbered.

Don Liuzzi, drums and vocals, has been the principal timpanist of the Philadelphia Orchestra for twenty-two years. His previous orchestral position was as a percussionist with the Pittsburgh Symphony. He is a regular performer with the Philorch lazz Quartet and Philadelphia Orchestra Percussion Group. His new solo and chamber music CD release on Equilibrium is called Movement in Time, and is the first volume of three under the project name "Philadelphia Percussion Project." He has been the executive producer with his company, Beat the Drum Entertainment for the DePue Brothers Band Weapons of Grass Construction, and Alex DePue's new CD, Stages. Don has been on the percussion faculty of Curtis Institute for the past seventeen years and the music director of the Philadelphia School District's All City Orchestra for six years. He was also the coordinating producer of the documentary film Music From the Inside Out and is a Yamaha performing artist.

Michael Munford has become known as one of the top and most creative banjoists of his generation. He has performed and toured with Tony Trischka on the "Double Banjo Spectacular" and is a regular member of the Washington (D.C.) based band, Frank Solivan and Dirty Kitchen. He performed on Peter Rowan's Grammy nominated album Bluegrass Boy. Mike's recent recording work includes Frank Solivan and Dirty Kitchen, receiving high acclaim and extensive airtime on XM Radio. He can also be heard on recordings with Mark Cosgrove, Dede Wyland, and Frank Wakefield. When not on the road performing, Mike is a principal banjo teacher in the mid-Atlantic region as well as being one of the top banjo repair and set-up technicians in the country.

Kevin MacConnell, bassist, is a long-time Philadelphia free-lance artist in many musical genres. He has performed with the Philadelphia Orchestra, the Philly Pops, and the Mann Center Orchestra in a PBS nationally televised special performing featured duos with the great diva Denyce Graves. Kevin's recent recording and performing activity includes work with jazz great Larry McKenna, Mark Cosgrove, Night Café Trio, and the new folk duo, The

Winterlings. He also has performed numerous traveling Broadway shows in Philadelphia and is a long-time faculty member with the University of the Arts. He can be heard on four tracks of the DePue Brothers band Weapons of Grass Construction.
