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INCREASING RETENTION OF STUDENTS

Following a nearly 5 percent increase in overall student enrollment for fall 2023, retention of new, first-time students has climbed to 75.3 percent for fall 2024, a more than four percent increase from fall 2023 retention of new, first-time students. Fall 2024 enrollment also includes a 50 percent increase in dual enrollment students and increases in three career preparation programs: an 18.7 percent increase in enrollment in the paramedic program, an 11 percent increase in enrollment at the Academy of Culinary Arts, and a 2.5 percent increase in enrollment in the school officer training program.

CELEBRATING OUR GRADUATES

A total of 563 students will be receiving their degrees at the university's December commencement on December 14. The graduates include 324 bachelor's degree recipients, 202 students completing master's degrees, and 33 students receiving doctoral degrees.

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CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO RURAL HEALTH



Pennsylvania's Department of Human Services Secretary Dr. Valerie Arkoosh presented the keynote address for IUP and Indiana Regional Medical Center (IRMC)'s Third Annual Pennsylvania Mountains Rural Health Conference on November 21. More than

300 people attended the conference, which focused on "Cultivating Wellness – Advancing Rural Mental Health Awareness, Research, Services, and Careers" and celebrated National Rural Health Day.

IUP and IRMC's joint podcast, Rural Health Pulse, began its third season with the episode "A Conversation with Dr. Miko Rose, the Founding Dean of the IUP Proposed College of Osteopathic Medicine" on November 21 to mark National Rural Health Day.

Four members of the community were recognized with the inaugural Rural Health Impact Awards during the IUP-IRMC Third Annual Pennsylvania Mountains Rural Health Conference: Joe Bujdos, Mental Health Director for the Armstrong-Indiana Behavioral and Developmental Health Program; Tammy Calderone, Armstrong-Indiana Behavioral and Development Health program administrator; Rachel Grove, director of Ambulatory Social Services with the IRMC Physician Group; and Dr. Joann Migyanka, special education professor emerita.

PROPOSED COLLEGE OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE MOVING FORWARD

IUP has formally signed seven clinical training affiliation agreements with regional medical centers and health agencies: Conemaugh Memorial Medical Center in December; Broad Top Area Medical Center, Hyndman Area Health Centers, Nulton Diagnostics and Treatment Center, and The Primary Health Network in November; Indiana Regional Medical Center in September and Punxsutawney Area Hospital in June. Clinical training agreements are key in securing accreditation from the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation.

The State System Board of Governors approved a \$2 million allocation in the 2024-25 capital allocations budget to design the academic building renovation for the health sciences cluster and the proposed college of osteopathic medicine.

As part of a reception welcoming Dr. Ryan Smith and Dr. Luke Mortensen to the proposed college of osteopathic medicine leadership team, Senator Joe Pittman and Representative Jim Struzzi announced that \$2 million from the 2024-25 state budget has been set aside for IUP's proposed college of osteopathic medicine. Smith was chosen in July as the founding Associate Dean of Clinical Affairs and Mortensen began working as the founding Associate Dean of Preclinical Affairs on August 1.

The State System Board of Governors approved \$500,000 for construction costs for the Academy of Culinary Arts academic building replacement project in the 2024-25 capital allocations budget. This funding will continue the progress on the Academy of Culinary Arts' long-range facilities plan, approved in March 2022 by the council, including constructing a 45,000-square-foot educational and multipurpose commercial facility in downtown Punxsutawney. The project also includes demolishing properties gifted to IUP adjacent to the Fairman Centre.
