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PROPOSED COLLEGE OF OSTEOPATHIC MEDICINE MOVING FORWARD



IUP has signed 11 clinical training affiliation agreements between its proposed college of osteopathic medicine and regional medical centers and health agencies across western Pennsylvania: Armstrong County Medical Center, Broad Top Area Medical Center, Clarion Psychiatric Center, Conemaugh Memorial Medical Center, Conemaugh Nason Medical Center, Hyndman Area Health Centers, Indiana Regional Medical Center, Nulton Diagnostics and Treatment Center, Penn Highlands Healthcare DuBois, The Primary Health Network, and Punxsutawney Area Hospital, with additional agreements in the pipeline. Clinical training agreements are a key step in securing accreditation from the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation.



Since the beginning of the new year, two gifts totaling \$500,000 have been made for IUP's proposed college of osteopathic medicine: one from an anonymous donor, the other from the Fairman Family Foundation of DuBois. More than \$31 million has been allocated through state or federal funding or private giving for the project.

CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO RURAL HEALTH EDUCATION

IUP and IRMC's joint podcast, Rural Health Pulse, continued its third season with episodes featuring Byron Stauffer, executive director of the Indiana County Center for Economic Operations; Tammy Calderone, administrator for the Armstrong-Indiana Behavioral and Developmental Health Program; and Theresa Gropelli, chair of IUP's Department of Nursing and Allied Health.



Theodore Lazzaro, owner and founder of Aestique Plastic Surgery of Greensburg, Shadyside, and Wexford, has gifted \$50,000 to IUP to establish a scholarship for students pursuing a degree in a healthcare field.

The Center for Rural Pennsylvania is funding a state-wide research study, developed by Miko Rose, founding dean of IUP's proposed college of osteopathic medicine and Paul Hawkins, from IUP's Applied Research Lab, to determine commonalities of physicians who commit to and stay in rural health care practice.



STUDENT HEALTH AND WELL-BEING

IUP's PsyD (doctoral psychology program) Graduate Student Organization (PGSO) is using a Pennsylvania Department of Education MASLOW grant of \$1,000 to support student mental health with a student relaxation room.

IUP received \$40,000 through Pennsylvania Governor Josh Shapiro's It's On Us PA initiative to continue the university's work to combat campus sexual assault. Programming funded by the grant will focus on first-year students.

RANKINGS AND ACCOLADES

In recognition of IUP's ongoing research commitment and doctoral student success, IUP has earned an R2 Doctoral University--High Spending and Doctorate Production classification from the American Council on Education and the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in its 2025 Research Activity designations. IUP first received the R2 ranking in 2022. It remains one of only two public universities in Pennsylvania and one of only 97 public universities nationwide with this classification.
