- Dr. Creely welcomed the center directors for the final fall semester meeting. The spring semester meetings will include representatives from the IUP Office of Development and, hopefully, the PA Chamber.
- Dr. Boldin presented information on his featured center, the Small Business Incubator. He
 described how IUP came to own the Robertshaw building and how the center has used space
 there over the years.
 - Currently, the Small Business Incubator occupies 30,000 square feet and has 14 tenants.
 (The list of current tenants and brochure are attached). Dr. Boldin estimates that over 100 small businesses have been incubated in this space since the center was established.
 - Tenants pay \$3.60 per square foot (without air conditioning) or \$6.00 per square foot (with air conditioning), and this charge includes utilities.
 - Typically, a small business will stay in the space for 3-5 years, while they are becoming established. They are encouraged to hire an attorney and CPA and to concentrate on their businesses.
 - o Last year, the tenants generated about \$12 million in revenue, and this year it is projected at \$14 million.
 - o The tenants are assisted by the other Eberly College of Business & Information Technology centers. The Government Contracting Assistance Program helps them to find grants. The Small Business Development Center advises them on getting their business started. The Small Business Institute provides students who donate time and gain valuable experience.
 - Using the 1.4 multiplier for the 1990-2010 period, tenants and graduates of the incubator have added over \$1 billion to the regional economy.

- Project Development Officers from the IUP Research Institute attended the meeting in order to continue the discussion from last month's meeting and to answer any new questions.
 - Dr. Pagnucci requested information on finding donors for projects. Ms. Eisenhower said the IUP RI has a form online requiring key words, but suggested they utilize SPINPlus and PA Foundations Online themselves for more effective and timely results.
 - o There was discussion on how a gift (routed through the IUP Foundation Office) differs from a grant (routed through the IUP RI). Dr. Creely said that she has met with William Speidel (Associate VP for Development) to discuss the process in detail. Mr. Speidel will attend a future center directors meeting to discuss how centers can seek donations.
 - Ms. Eisenhower asked center directors to keep Robin Gorman (in the IUP President's Office) informed about any donations that are received.
 - The IUP RI project development officers have been working on revising the website and will add links to the IUP Office of Institutional Research, Planning and Assessment, PA Census Bureau, and US Census Bureau website pages that provide data needed for grant proposals.
 - o The IUP RI project development officers encourage center directors to contact them if they need estimates for release time, summer contracts, graduate assistantships, etc. They are hesitant to put general numbers on the website, since there are so many variables to consider. They can provide customized information to the center directors in 1-2 days.
 - o Dr. Pagnucci said it is very difficult to get new faculty members interested in applying for grants, considering the teaching load and committee assignments. He feels that they become "burned out" before they even begin. Ms. Eisenhower had a document generated by Lisa Newell that addressed researcher concerns. (This document will be sent to the C&I directors at a later time.)
 - The President's Advancing Grantsmanship Fund
 (http://www.iup.edu/newsItem.aspx?id=116662&blogid=2573) provides faculty some incentive to submit grant proposals.
 - The IUP RI project development officers offered to participate in faculty meetings to present and/or discuss research related topics.
 - Dr. Creely said that more release time is desperately needed for research and scholarship, and she hopes that faculty groups can provide a consistent and persuasive message to university administrators.
 - Dr. Runge said departments and colleges can be helpful to new faculty by assigning them less class preparations and committee work.
 - Dr. Maier asked if the IUP RI assists students who are looking for internships. Ms.
 Eisenhower said the IUP RI can help if the funding proposal must come from the university and not directly from the student.

Tax Incentives

The Incubator has been granted KIZ (Keystone Innovation Zone Tax Credit) whereby tax credits can be used to offset certain state tax liabilities and significantly contribute to the ability of young KIZ companies to transition throughout the stages of growth.

Your company maybe eligible for KIZ tax credit if you:

1) have been in operation for less than eight years,

2) are located within the boundaries of a DCED approved KIZ, and 3) operate within one or more of the targeted industry sectors of a particular KIZ and have worked with the KIZ coordinator.

An <u>Incubator tenant</u> is offered initial rental rates lower than standard commercial rates. Gradual rate increases ease the initial financial burden faced by all businesses in the start-up phase, but prepare the business for its ultimate responsibilities in the greater community.
