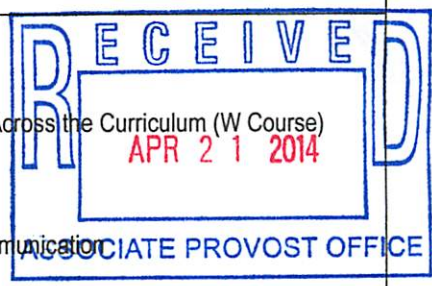

**1. Catalog Description**

**Bachelor of Science in Education—English Education**

The undergraduate English Education catalog description, “Bachelor of Science in Education - English Education” on page 105 of the current Undergraduate Catalog 2013 – 2014 will remain the same. The description of the program as stated needs no revisions; however, the list of courses will change:

1. As the result of a course number/title change--ENGL 318/518 Literature for Adolescents will be ENGL 418/518 Young Adult Literature.
2. As we move to adapt to the early acceptance MATE program. This means that we will accept the graduate level of the following classes for undergraduate credit:
  - a. ENGL 415/515
  - b. ENGL 418/518
  - c. ENGL 426/526
  - d. EDSP 477/577

This program revision reflects a change in the number and title of a required major course, ENGL 318/518 Literature for Adolescents, to ENGL 418/518 Young Adult Literature.

**Rationale for Change**

Changing the course number from 318 to 418 results from adding "senior standing" as a prerequisite for the course. This prerequisite was added to align the course with requirements for the Master of Arts in Teaching English (MATE) accelerated 4+1 program that will permit undergraduate students during the senior year to earn graduate credit for the course if they have been accepted into the MATE 4+1 accelerated program. The change in course title reflects the terminology used by the market and publishers.

**1. How will the proposed revision affect students already in the existing program?**

This revision will mean that students who have not yet fulfilled the ENGL 318/518 requirement will take this course during the senior year, the semester prior to the student teaching semester.

Faculty resources are adequate, as the course is a revision of an existing course that has been taught both fall and spring semesters over the past several years.

There are no additional requirements for other resources as this time.

**4. Do you expect an increase or decrease in the number of students as a result of this revision? If so, how will the department adjust?**

Neither an increase nor decrease in the number of students enrolled in the program as a result of this revision is anticipated.

IUP's undergraduate English Education Program evaluation plan is based upon evaluation criteria established by the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) and the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP). These criteria are enumerated and explained in *NCTE/NCATE Program Standards for Initial Preparation of Teachers of Secondary English Language Arts, Grades 7 – 12* (October 2012) available online at: <http://www.ncte.org/cee/ncate/program>. (The National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education changed its name to the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation after these standards were adopted.)

The revised course that this program revision includes is designed to meet the following NCTE/NCATE program standard:

- **Content Knowledge: Element 1:** Candidates are knowledgeable about texts—print and non-print texts, media texts, classic texts and contemporary texts, including young adult—that represent a range of world literatures, historical traditions, genres, and the experiences of different genders, ethnicities, and social classes; they are able to use literary theories to interpret and critique a range of texts.

The undergraduate English Education Program is evaluated every three years by the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) and every five years by the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) and the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP).
