Chair's Corner

Greetings from Stouffer Hall!

I hope that your fall semester is off to a wonderful start and that you are finding both challenge and support in the work that you are doing. As I write this message to you, fall is in full swing in western Pennsylvania and the colors are extraordinary.

Here at IUP, the semester is off to a wonderful start and 27 new students joined us this fall. Our overall enrollment remains strong. I fully recognize that we have you to thank for that success. Again this year, the majority of incoming SAHE students described how SAHE program alumni were an important factor in their decision to apply to the program. We graduated a large group of students last spring and as you will see from the list of their new positions on page 3 of this issue of Developments, they have been incredibly successful.

This continues to be a transitional time in SAHE. Over the summer, the faculty announced that we would be phasing out the Comprehensive Examination in favor of a new Portfolio requirement. The students of the Class of 2015 will be given the option of completing either the Comprehensive Examination or the Portfolio. With the Class of 2016, they can choose between competing the Portfolio or a Thesis. Our portfolio requirement is framed around the ACPA-NASPA Professional Competency Areas for Student Affairs Professionals. This will also impact the organization of our courses as we work to more clearly link our courses to the Competency Areas.

We have already begun actively recruiting the next cohort of SAHE students and hope that you will continue to refer your best and brightest students to us. Students who are interested in the program should be encouraged to visit the SAHE website for more information. They can also email us with any questions they may have at sahe-admissions@iup.edu. At your request, we can send you posters to display in your office and materials share with prospective students.

On a more personal note, I am having a great semester. I have taken on a new role within APSCUF (IUP's Faculty Union) as the Chair of the Meet and Discuss Team which meets each month with the senior administration to discuss important issues. I have spent a great deal of time in October traveling to speak at conferences across the country including Orlando, Denver, and Louisville. I look forward to crossing paths with many of you in the spring at ACPA and NASPA. We will again host an IUP SAHE reception at ACPA in Tampa and hopefully a less formal gathering at NASPA in New Orleans.




I hope that your summer and fall have been as fulfilling as mine. And, as always, I hope to see many of you at this spring's professional conferences.

Awarded since 1999, the Nancy Newkerk Scholarship is awarded to a second-year SAHE graduate student who demonstrates outstanding contributions to college students, student affairs activities, the SAHE Department, and the broader higher education community. November 5, 2014 John Mueller presented the Nancy Newkerk Scholarship for 2014 to two recipients: Britany Gallagher '15 and Anna Moronski '15.

Britany Gallagher is a graduate of Penn State University and a current SAHE graduate student. She has a graduate assistantship with Campus Initiatives in the IUP Center for Student Life. In presenting the scholarship to Gallagher, John Mueller shared a quote from a letter of support for Gallagher which stated, "Britany is both an educator and motivator. It is clear that she advocates the needs of students and, in turn, they confide in and seek out her advice. She successfully blends her past experiences and current knowledge of the field to create genuine relationships with students."

Anna Moronski is a graduate of West Chester University and a current SAHE graduate student. She holds a graduate assistantship in the Office of Housing, Residential Living, and Dining at the IUP Punxsutawney campus. Mueller quoted one of Moronski's references: "Anna has a student-centered approach to problem solving and is often one of the first people to remind us of our mission when making decisions. She takes 'the road less traveled,' even if it is rockier, if it means that students will benefit from that path."

Nancy Newkerk served as Dean of Women at IUP (then Indiana State Teachers College) from 1957 to 1967 and as Associate Dean of Admissions at IUP from 1978 until her retirement in 1994. She was awarded the IUP President's Medal of Distinction in 2009.

Student Development Specialist American University of Afghanistan



Since graduating from the SAHE program last spring, I have relocated to Kabul for a new position as a Student Development Specialist at the American University of Afghanistan. Locat-

ed in southern Kabul, this institution provides 1,300 male and female students with a liberal arts education at both bachelor and master levels. For this area, it is particularly unique in allowing students to choose their own course of study. Through my professional capacity, I work all levels of undergraduate students.


My official title is Student Development Specialist and I

serve in the functional area of Residence Life. I manage seven guesthouse-style residence halls, ten Resident Assistants, and four Resident Hall Coordinators in addition to teaching one first-year seminar course. As a very young institution, some of the challenges arise from having to develop aspects of the department from the ground up. Residence Life is quite different here and requires both ingenuity and flexibility. Security

threats can close down campus. Managing the residence halls from a distance, when vital functions like the dining hall and Internet may be inaccessible, are some of the unique challenges of working in a warzone. Another challenge lies with the buildings themselves. The seven residence halls are rented guesthouses and pose numerous facilities challenges. Electrical and plumbing issues are common but difficult to address. Construction supplies are limited and most issues require pieces to be fabricated on site by our facilities department. Working to find temporary solutions can be a full time job in itself, and I credit the talented



staff of the university for creating an environment where these solutions are embraced. Staff and faculty alike employ a hands-on approach to



Like many small institutions, it is common for staff and faculty to volunteer in many different capacities on campus. It is not solely out of need, but also out of a desire to work together for the benefit of our student body. Our students have all lived through incredible circumstances, whether in Afghanistan or as refugees in foreign countries. As a whole, they are passionate

about their country and their education. They dream about becoming lawyers, ambassadors, politicians, business owners, and presidents. Behind almost every dream is a strong desire to create a brighter future for their country. It is humbling to see people who have been through so much, retain the strength to dream. That quality is particularly astounding given the challenge life outside of the universi-

ty gates. Everyday, we are bombarded with news of violence and destruction that constantly threatens to invade our gates. Many of our students from provinces risk being killed while going home just for attending an American University. Our students put these risks and fears aside to approach each day with a vigor and energy that is inspiring.

Working in Afghanistan has been one of the greatest privileges of my life. I am thankful for the many lessons that I learned throughout my time in SAHE that have helped to guide me through my transition to a new work force. I am also particularly grateful for my SAHE colleagues that supported me in my decision to pursue work in Kabul.

Recently, Brenda Cruz '15, Britany Gallagher '15, and I presented a session at this year's annual Pennsylvania College Personnel Association (PCPA) conference.

Our PCPA session, entitled "The Journey is the Experience," advocated for more intentional assessment practices within the context of education abroad programs. While research shows that international experiences can significantly and positively impact the development of college students, and while students perceive studying abroad to be of value, some students elect not to think about the ways in which assessment can be incorporated into participate in these programs because they do not believe study abroad is particularly useful for their career plans. We argued that it is important for education abroad offices to design learning outcomes that reflect the institutional mission, and help students connect those learning outcomes to their individual professional development so that they no longer perceive an international experience as one that is abstractly "life-changing."

Using assessment examples from institutions nationwide, we showed that assessment of education abroad can be inconsistent, with some institutions devoting more time to evaluating student satisfaction rather than learning. We proposed that offices can utilize student development theory and CAS Standards to create an assessment tool that reflects their learning outcomes and suggested that this assessment occur at pre-departure events and again upon their return at re-entry programs to measure student growth. Results from these regular studies can be used to give curi-

Additionally, we facilitated a larger discussion about assessment with our session attendees. I really enjoyed our conversation about how assessment takes places (or does not take place) within our different offices and institutions, and individuals offered many great ideas and suggestions for how professionals can conduct more effective assessment. While only one person in our session shared that she works within an education abroad setting, I hope that the larger point of our presentation—that regular, localized assessment is key in determining what, how, and whether student learning is taking place—inspired everyone in attendance to their everyday student affairs practice.

Balancing Student Advocacy & Activism with Administrative Expectations

For seven years at Barnard College, I had the privilege of being the club adviser for Take Back the Night and V-Day, which are two international organizations that focus on increasing awareness around sexual assault, rape culture, and social inequality. Those student groups hosted various programs throughout the year that encouraged discourse around topics that are never easy to tackle. I supported the students in planning the logistics while helping them stay true to their missions and encouraging them to do appropri-

ate research so their credibility was never compromised. This becomes especially important when Columbia University is one of several higher education institutions that have federal complaints filed against them due to claims of mishandling sexual assaults on campus. I often had to ask myself "What is my role? How do I balance being an advocate for students in their roles as activ-

ists while remaining objective to the issues at hand? How do I offer a safe space in my office while making it clear that I can never promise full confidentiality? How do I validate student experiences while representing an administrative voice?" So. Many. Questions.

I know that I'm not alone in asking those same questions. It's especially tough when you're a mandated reporter who works with many students who self-identify as sexual assault survivors. It's one thing for a student to self-identity as a survivor but it becomes a complicated situation once a student chooses to share his/her/their story and discloses

that the incident took place on campus. This is where mandated reporting enters the picture. I truly believe there are good intentions in mandated reporting, but as many students and educators have pointed out, sometimes this causes more harm than good. Students may choose to not disclose or seek assistance out of fear of possibly going through a hearing process. Not every survivor wants a hearing and it's important for community members to understand what their rights are when it comes to these issues. Knowing their

rights means reading and understanding all of the policies and procedures that are inplace on the seemingly never-ending hyperlinks upon hyperlinks of information. It's a daunting task that can feel overwhelming and sometimes (unfortunately) triggering which can lead to the decision of "Never mind. This is too complicated. I'll just keep this to myself." Obviously, this is not ideal. When a student says "never

mind," I think we've failed this person and we need to find effective ways of dealing with this reality for so many students.

While I'm no longer at Barnard, I know there are hundreds of other administrators who are currently in that position and I often wonder if they have the same questions. How are they handling those discussions? Do they agree with the policies? How has the law impacted the field? It's not an easy task when student affairs practitioners are constantly balancing student voices, administrative expectations, and state and federal laws. That balancing act often made me feel unhelpful, which was certainly not ideal when working with such sensitive issues. So where does the field go from here?

In the summer of 2014, three IUP students, Danie Brush '14, Jackie Fisher '15 and Meghan Olbrys '15 and SAHE faculty, Dr. John Mueller participated in Miami University's (Ohio) International Student Affairs Study Tour to Europe. The trip was co-sponsored by Miami University and Bowling Green State University's Higher Education Programs.

The first stop was Paris, France. We spent four days exploring the city and visiting the American University of Paris and CROUS de Paris. Later, we traveled to Brussels, Belgium, where we visited the European Commission, followed by a four day visit in Amsterdam, Netherlands. While in Amsterdam, we had the opportunity to meet with representatives from the University of Amsterdam. We then spent a few days in Antwerp, Belgium, where we met with a number of students and staff from the Antwerpen Studententstat, the University of Antwerp, and the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven. These visits gave us the opportunities to not only learn about other cultures and different forms of education, but also allowed us to develop a better understanding of our own Higher Education System in the United States. We also had the opportunity to take walking tours, visit museums, eat at local restaurants, see the iconic sites and get to know our new colleagues and friends. The tour's main event was in Luxembourg, where we attended and participated in the Third Transatlantic Dialogue.
