

Help our student Hawks soar with Merit Scholarship Opportunities – Remember the Acronym <u>BIRDS</u>

Be Aware of the merit scholarship opportunities that students in your programs would most likely be interested in and prepared to apply.

Identify students in your programs that are candidates for these opportunities and talk with them about the benefits of applying.

Refer students to the Merit Scholarship Advisor to assist them with the application process.

Discuss their application progress at each advising session and help them connect with departmental resources to develop their application.

Support students in the application process by providing feedback on their personal statements, helping them obtain strong recommendation letters, and assisting other application components.

Boren: due January annually; provides \$20k for language study abroad.

Fulbright Open Study: due September annually; 9-12 mo. abroad for independent study or research

Fulbright ETA: due September annually; 9-12 mo. abroad as an English teaching Assistant

Marshall: due September annually; earn a grad degree in the UK

<u>Mitchell</u>: due September annually; one year of post-grad study in Ireland

<u>Pickering</u>: due September annually; funds for grad programs focused on public service

<u>Rhodes</u>: due September annually; study abroad at Oxford

Truman: due January annually; up to \$30k for grad education in public service

<u>Goldwater</u>: due January annually; up to \$7.5K for students in science fields

Udall: up to \$7k for undergrad interested in environmental sustainability and Native American issues



9-Month Gantt Chart on Completing a Merit Scholarship Application Developing a strong merit scholarship application is a marathon. Advisors should be preparing students to begin their applications 9 months in advance of deadlines. The chart below outlines the preparation timeline.

Pathways to a Merit Scholarship
